Becomign a Theological Librarian

"So how did you happen to become a theological librarian?" This question and variations of it remain one of my favorite questions to ask colleagues. I have yet to hear of anyone who

as a child piped up with "theological librarian" in the midst of playmates wishing to become doctors, firemen, or garbage collectors. Many of us came into theological librarianship after college and entry into librarianship or theological studies. We started out as a student worker in the seminary library; we found an internship or first job in a theological library; we were introduced or recruited by a theological librarian; or we attended an ATLA Annual Conference.

I met with a prospective student last week who discovered theological librarianship at the ATLA Annual Conference in St. Louis. He had been encouraged to attend as a student in library school and received one of our scholarships to make attendance possible. The ATLA Conference was a watershed moment as he got to know the membership and entered into the conversation. He mentioned our colleague André Paris as one whom he connected with at the conference and was quite sorry to hear of his passing.

This got me to thinking about our role in recruiting, encouraging, and, hopefully, hiring the next generation of theological librarians. Have you talked to your student workers? Have you recruited interns from your local library school? Or interns from your local college? How do we talk about our profession? And at ATLA Annual Conference, how can we be most welcoming to those interested or simply curious about theological librarianship? How can we begin to engage them in the conversation? Some of us find this work as a "calling" and others as a "career," but each of us can do our part in continuing to welcome new people into this important work.



discussion of the Committee's contributions to the ATLA Organizational Ends, helping to further align the work of member groups with the overall goals of the Association.


The Committee will continue discussions and work via e-mail and reconvene for meetings in the spring.


The Committees also met with staff from the Center for the Study of Information and Religion at Kent State University, with whom the 2013 Conference will be co-located.

ATLA Endowment Committee Meeting

The ATLA Endowment Committee met November 13-14, 2012, in Chicago, IL. The meeting was chaired by Dan LaValla and attended by committee members Marti Alt, Bill Faupel, and Dennis Swanson, along with ATLA staff liaisons Brenda Bailey-Hainer and Marie Jacobsen.

The committee reviewed their charge, and discussed it in the context of ATLA's overall mission

and organizational ends. Marie Jacobsen provided an update on the current value of the Endowment Fund, which was \$290,360 as of November 1, 2012.

Several options for making it easier for donors to make contributions were discussed, including payment of pledges to be made over a set period of time, recurring credit card payments, accepting PayPal Committee Commit

account payments, and adding a donation option to the conference registration form.

A representative from the UNIVEST Foundation provided an overview of Charitable Giving Annuities (CGA) via conference call. The committee will be

investigating whether CGA should be made available as an option to support the ATLA Endowment Fund in addition to the planned giving option.

A mailing soliciting donations was planned for the end of November. Roger Loyd, recently retired former chair of the committee, graciously offered to write a letter encouraging members to make donations. ATLA will be matching, dollar for dollar, all donations made between June 1, 2012, and May 31, 2013, up to a total amount of \$7,500.

The Endowment Committee will have an increased

presence at the 2013 ATLA Annual Conference through exhibit booth with information about donation options, update on retired and lifetime ATLA members, and by placing an ad in the conference program. In addition, the committee will make a brief appeal to members during the business meeting.

During the next

six months, the committee will work on creating literature and presentations that provide a clear case statement for contributing to the Endowment Fund.
