REPORT FROM THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

By now you should have received the very informative packet of information about our upcoming ATLA conference. The Program Committee and your hosts in Kansas City have worked very hard this whole spring season in trying to provide as comprehensive and as profitable a program for our interests as they could. The workshops are particularly pointed and I hope that many will be able to participate.

If the vitality of the Association can be measured by ballot responses, I can assure you that ATLA is alive and well. Although I had to mail out an extra ballot within four days of mailing the first one, I was already too late for at least a dozen librarians who had returned their ballots immediately. Then we discovered we had sent out ballots to persons not eligible to vote. I regret the inconvenience these mailings have caused you, but I trust that we are now on track and that these kinds of problems will not happen in the future.

We are also most pleased to be swamped by the checks coming in for renewals of personal and institutional memberships. May I encourage you all to take care of this important business as soon as possible.

We are considering a proposal to the Publication Committee to solicit advertizing for the <u>Summary of Proceedings</u>. If any of you have strong feelings on this, I would be happy to hear them.

I have agreed to let this office be a liaison for a program at Maredsous. The office will receive a subscription to their publication, <u>Debora - Doc Informations</u>; they may list our office as a place in this country to send orders and checks. We will serve as a channel for sending the orders and checks on to Belgium. This will apply to some microfilm projects as well as their newsletter. I am doing this in the interest of expanding our concerns to information about projects of the European theological community.

I have been informed by a number of representatives of institutions of the problem that is arising with refunding postage of 50 cents. With good reason, these individuals have pointed out that having a \$1.00 minimum return of postage would be a much more reasonable amount, given the cost of postage in these days. I simply call this to your attention at this time in the hope that when we send out the next notice for exchange with the labels that you will note this change which we will introduce at that time. It is encouraging to see the good use that is made of this program. Since May 1985, there have been 105 duplicate exchange lists sent out by 96 institutions. It is a pleasure to be able to facilitate this cooperative project.

Individuals, particularly those who enjoy sabbaticals, may appreciate the service and the facilities of the program at Saint Deiniol's Residential Libr-ry in Hawarden, England. BIBLIOGRAPHIC SYSTEMS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Annual Meeting. The Bibliographic Systems Section meeting at the ATLA Annual Conference will be given over (along with our regular business) to a discussion of trends in classification, reclassification, and retrospective conversion at ATLA libraries. To add some reality to our discussion, I have mailed a questionnaire to all ATLA institutions with 14 multiple choice questions on it. It should take less than 5 minutes to fill out and return to me, and I believe that we will glean some significant data from it that will let us know how we all stand.

New Edition of PEOPLENET Directory. Cliff Wunderlich of Andover-Harvard Theological Library is preparing a new edition update of last year's PEOPLENET directory. He hopes to compile, produce and distribute it to those at the meeting in June. Please fill out the questionnaire Cliff sent to you recently and get them in so we can better know each other.

New Subject Headings Products from the Library of Congress. The Library of Congress has announced (Cataloging Service Bulletin 31, Winter 1986, p. 77) a new assortment of subject headings products in machine readable tape, microfiche and paper formats.

- 1. Paper formats: LC will stop producing the quarterly paper supplements to the Library of Congress Subject Headings. The last paper supplement will be the 1985 annual cumulation which will supplement the new 10th edition of LCSH which covers headings established through December 1984. Beginning in calendar year 1987, LC will publish each year a fully cumulated hard copy edition of the LCSH. The LC Subject Headings Weekly List will continue to be issued as a monthly update service in paper format.
- 2. Microfiche format: The quarterly cumulative microfiche edition will continue to be issued.
- 3. Magnetic tape format: LC has distributed a test tape of 100 subject authority records to various vendors and utilities and will make available a tape of the entire subject authority system by the end of June. OCLC, UTLAS, BNA, and NOTIS are considering mounting these tapes to make the information available to their members. OCLC is considering using them in conjunction with their Linked-Systems Project.

Current LC Subject Headings in the Field of Religion. This Bibliographic Systems Committee publication will continue through volume 3 (the current year) but will be reevaluated at the annual conference by the committee, in light of the developments described above. The March 1986 issue (v.3, no. 3) will be mailed by mid-June and will cover the Weekly Lists through March 14.

PRESERVATION BOARD REPORT

The pace of preservation microfilming is moving ahead rapidly. To date, 587 monographs have been newly cataloged and shipped for microfilming. Full subscribers have received two fiche shipments, and partial subscribers receive their fiche as they are completed.

Libraries and seminaries which are not subscribers are urged to write the office of the Preservation Board for information about taking part in the program. Some libraries find the program an excellent way to build and enhance their collections. Others find the microfiche a very convenient and inexpensive means to preserve books and avoid rebinding costs. Still other libraries can use the cataloging-on-fiche as retrospective conversion data for their card or fiche catalog. For most libraries, microfiche are an excellent medium for saving space without filling already crowded bookshelves.

On-line cataloging is not yet available. Our RLIN terminal is in place but we are not yet provided with a dedicated line for cataloging. Please be patient a few more weeks. Our commitment is to make the information also available through OCLC and UTLAS.

Plans for the 1986 preservation year are also far advanced. Several librarians have made specific commitments and others have expressed interest in providing books for microfilming. During 1986 the following areas will be used for preservation microfilming:

- 1. Theology 700 titles Union Theological Seminary
- 2. Philology & language 500 titles Union Theological Seminary
- 3. Church History 1000 titles Union Theological Seminary
- 4. Religious Education 600 titles Union Theological Seminary
- 5. Bible 500 titles Princeton Theological Seminary
- 6. Comparative Religion 200 titles Meadville-Lombard Theological Seminary
- 7. Catholic Theology - Catholic University and University of Notre Dame
- 8. Evangelism & Preaching under consideration

The procedure is that subject areas are selected from a comparative table of LC/UTS classes. A single library is selected to choose within a broad subject area each year in order to avoid duplication. Lists will be compiled in each subject area (1-4 are now available), and ultimately they will be merged into the new 1986 Selections list.

Libraries and librarians are welcome to submit suggestions, to volunteer participation from their library, and to propose subjects for selection.

Preservation microfilming is one means for solving the brittle book problem which is so devastating to many theology collections.

ATLANTIC SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY PLANS NEW LIBRARY

The first stage of planning for a new library facility for the Atlantic School of Theology in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada, has recently been completed. The school has received the final report, A Needs Assessment and Library Building Programme for the Atlantic School of Theology, from the library planner, Albert Bowron, of Toronto. The study which was begun in September 1985 involved three extended on-site visits and a three-month review of the present library operation, facilities, and space. Visits were made to other libraries; and students, faculty, senior officers, alumni, and library staff were interviewed. A questionnaire soliciting opinions and suggestions with regard to present and future library services was widely distributed, while three meetings were held with the Library Building Planning Committee for discussion of both oral and written reports. The report from Mr. Bowron is now in the hands of the Board of Governors of the School to serve as a guide for their planning of the new library facility; and the Library Building Planning Committee is awaiting authorization from the Board to select an architect. Mrs. Alice W. Harrison is the Librarian.

The caliber of proposed projects remained at a high level. The committee was pleased to make one grant to an ATLA member. It is hoped that other members will receive sabbatical/research leaves or other assistance to work on substantive bibliographical projects which would encourage them to apply for grants.

RELIGION INDEXES ANNOUNCEMENTS

Religion Index Two: Multi-author Works (RIT), 1984, was shipped to subscribers on May 9, 1986.

Religion Index One: Periodicals (RIO), volume 17, 1985, is in press with a projected shipping date of August 1986.

Index to Book Reviews in Religion is doing well. The second bimonthly installment was shipped May 7-9, 1986. Your comments on this new publication would be appreciated by the editor and the executive director.

The first phase of retooling the Indexes' computer system was achieved during the 1985/86 fiscal year with the purchase of a new super-micro system. In fiscal 1986/87 we plan to develop and implement the new software for the production of the Indexes.

ATLA libraries will receive a three-part survey requesting your response to the usefulness of:

- 1. a cumulation of RIT 1976-1980 in two volumes; vol. 1 would be for author/editor entries with table of contents; vol. 2 would be the subject index. In addition, 1,200 titles with 14,300 articles from 1970-1980 will be added in this reissue. Projected price is \$280.00 pre-publication and \$345.00 after publication.
- 2. a proposed cumulation of book reviews from 1949-1979, with some indication as to your preference for these to be done in three ten-year cumulations, 1949-1959, 1960-1969, 1970-1979, or one thirty-year cumulation, 1949-1979.
- 3. the reissue of Index to Religious Periodical Literature (IRPL), vols 5-11, 1960-74; this reissue would be done in three separate volumes: vols. 5-6, 1960-1964; vols. 7-9, 1965-1970; vols. 10-11, 1971-1974. The number of periodical titles added to these revised and expanded volumes would be approximately 120 for 1960-64; approximately 160 for 1965-1970; and approximately 200 for 1971-74. The added titles would reflect a consistent pattern of making titles indexed within this project consistent with the current RIO list.

The second revised edition of <u>Psychology and Religion</u>: a <u>Bibliography Selected from the ATLA Religion Database</u>, edited by Albert E. Hurd, <u>May 1986</u>, 586 pages, \$47.00, is available.

A new special bibliography entitled From the Reformation Through the Nineteenth Century: the Reformed Traditions is being edited by Thomas J. Davis and has a projected publication date of July 1986.

LEO T. CRISMON, 1906-1986

Dr. Leo Taylor Crismon, Librarian Emeritus of The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, died suddenly at his home February 19, 1986. Born in Iberia, Missouri, on February 24, 1906, he was nearly 80 years of age. A graduate of William Jewell College with the A.B. in 1930, he received the Th.M. in 1933 and the Ph.D. in 1935 in Greek New Testament from Southern Seminary. He served the Seminary on its library staff for thirty-four years: Assistant Librarian, 1937-41; Associate Librarian, 1941-49; Acting Librarian, 1949-51; and Librarian, 1951-1971. He helped design, and in 1960 inaugurate the use of the then world's largest theological seminary library building, the magnificent James P. Boyce Centennial Library. Additionally, in the twenty-year period from 1951 until 1971, he was very effective in building up the basis of the modern collection of the Seminary's library holdings, the development of the Church Music Library, and the recruitment and development of a full staff of six professional career librarians. He made outstanding contributions to the Kentucky Baptist Historical Society and Commission, as well as to The Southern Baptist Historical Society and Commission, receiving the latter's Distinguished Service Award in 1983. Retiring as Librarian on July 31, 1971, he rendered valuable consultative services to Southern Baptist foreign mission seminary libraries in Brazil, Argentina, Vietnam, Indonesia, the Philippines, Japan, Hong Kong, and Taiwan. He leaves his widow, Viola Crismon of 404 Pleasantview Avenue, Louisville, Kentucky 40206; a daughter, Leola Jo Waller of Verona, Kentucky; a son, Frederick W. Crismon of Vielschiek, Germany; and seven grandchildren. Dr. Crismon was a charter member of ATLA, serving as co-host of its first annual conference at Louisville in 1947. He faithfully attended most all of the meetings of the Association thereafter until his retirement. He served the Association for six years (1962-1968) as a member of its Commission on Lilly Endowment Scholarships, and as Chairman, 1967-68. He also served a two-year term on the Association's Executive Committee, 1967-69.
