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From the President The Ongoing Relevance of Carol Kuhlthau's Information Search Process to Theological Education

Students in my research class at Union Theological Seminary recently read and discussed an excerpt from Carol Kuhlthau's

Seeing Meaning: A Process Approach to Library and Information Services, 2nd edition. Kuhlthau first formulated her information search process model in 1985, and continued to develop it throughout the course of her career. In it she described six stages of the information search process: (1) task initiation, (2) topic selection, (3) pre-focus exploration, (4) focus formulation, (5) information collection, (6) search closure and presentation. She also described an additional phase of reflection and assessment after the search process is completed and noted that not all students engage in this additional phase. The six-stage model is holistic in that it identifies three realms of human experience that appear in each stage of the process: the cognitive (thoughts), affective (feelings), and physical (actions). Kuhlthau notes that uncertainty in both thoughts and feelings increases and decreases throughout the process. In these moments of uncertainty, a "zone of intervention" appears for intermediaries such as librarians and educators. It is within these zones of intervention that we as librarians can be most effective and influential.

Thirty years later (Kuhlthau first published her model in 1985), seminary students still find her model helpful. Students in my class were impressed by how holistic she was, acknowledging thoughts, feelings, and actions. For them there is value in seeing the interconnectedness of the cognitive, affective, and physical realms throughout the research process. All of the students reported feeling encouraged and relieved to know that there are periods of uncertainty within the information seeking process. Their own experiences of uncertainty were affirmed. They were heartened to know that information seeking is a lengthier process with emotional ups and downs rather than a single event of instant revelation. One student even likened the model to a lengthier vocational discernment process. Another student noted that the process is similar to childbirth in that you had to go through one stage to get to another (e.g., pre-focus exploration to focus formulation). As in childbirth, you cannot skip stages of the process. The students asked

about the librarian's role(s) in their information seeking process. Previously, they thought that the librarian's primary role was to help them find where materials were located. They left the class with a much fuller understanding of how librarians can provide insight and support throughout their research processes, the larger scholarly communication process, and within the greater endeavor of theological education. Kuhlthau's model and explanation raised their level of respect for our multifaceted work.

If you have not looked at Kuhlthau's model, I encourage you to do so. There is a short summary here: https://comminfo.rutgers. edu/~kuhlthau/information search process.htm. I also encourage you to discuss this model with students, faculty, and researchers. As an administrator and manager, I find the model relevant for project management. Over the course of a project, optimism can give way to doubt or frustration, which can then lead to satisfaction or dissatisfaction. Knowing this beforehand leads to more successful projects. As ATLA President, I find the model relevant as the Board continues its strategic thinking process, moving from vague ideas about ATLA's future to more focused ones. Together the Board has selected topics on which to focus, has explored those topics, has collected information and input (especially from you as members), and has evaluated that information and input in order to formulate future directions for our association. In my upcoming columns, I look forward to sharing more details about our process with you, moving toward Kuhlthau's sixth stage, presentation.

ATLA Partnering with SCELC on *New York Times* "Academic Pass" Offer

Through its relationship with SCELC, ATLA is able to participate in an inter-consortial offer that allows ATLA member libraries to provide an "academic pass" to the *New York Times* web edition. The "academic pass" access to the *New York Times* is identical to that provided by an individual subscription.

Previously, this offer was available for a limited time frame. But it has been updated and currently signed order forms received by the 10th of each month will activate their subscriptions on the first Monday of the following month. Order forms received by SCELC after this date will result in a subscription start date one month later.

Through this offer, most ATLA member libraries are able to subscribe for about \$1.66 per FTE student enrollment plus faculty headcount. A SCELC transaction fee of 5% up to \$50 will also apply. For example, if an institution has 1,000 FTE, then its annual subscription cost would be \$1.66 x 1,000, or \$1,660 + \$50 (since 5% would be \$83) for a total of \$1,710.

If you decide to take advantage of this offer, your institution must be an ATLA member and also must become a SCELC Affiliate Member. There is no charge to become a SCELC Affiliate Member - <u>simply fill out the form</u>.

Coming Soon: A 2015 Salary and Benefits Survey

In 2009, ATLA surveyed its North American Institutional and Affiliate member libraries to benchmark the range of salary levels and benefits offered that year. The survey resulted in a publication, <u>ATLA 2009 Salary</u> and <u>Benefits Survey</u>, which many libraries have found useful for comparison purposes since other academic library surveys do not segment out theological libraries.

The information gathered for that publication is now five years old and it's time to refresh the data. In late February, ATLA will be sending out a new salary and benefits survey to directors at Institutional and Affiliate member libraries. The survey has been revised to make the questions more Canadian-friendly, to ask for additional details, and to reflect new positions in libraries that have evolved.

Please watch for the survey and take the time to complete it. The information gathered will be used to create a new document which will include an analysis of the 2015 data as well as a comparison with the 2009 data. The resulting publication will be valuable as an advocacy and budgeting tool for theological libraries throughout North America.

Archaeological Fellowship for Biblical Scholars Available

The Society of Biblical Literature supports and promotes the work of peer organizations that also serve many of our members. This is particularly true of the American Schools of Oriental Research (ASOR). We are bringing to your attention an inaugural award that is an opportunity for a non-tenured biblical scholar.

The William G. Dever Fellowship for Biblical Scholars is a two-month travel-study award (\$6,000) that will be made available in the summer of 2015 to a qualified American untenured faculty member in the field of biblical studies who wants to acquire elementary, first-hand experience in field archaeology and research in Israel. The intent of the award, administered by ASOR, is to help foster a dialogue between archaeology and biblical studies in colleges, universities, and seminaries, as well as in the larger discipline.

The William G. Dever Archaeological Fellowship for Biblical Scholars will provide \$6,000 to be used towards transportation; one month on a specified dig; and one month travel to other digs, combined with a one-month residency (room and half-board) at the W. F. Albright Institute of Archaeological Research in Jerusalem, which will allow the Dever Fellow to conduct research in the Albright library. During residency, the Albright Institute will facilitate visits to excavations active in the field.

Bridwell Library Announces Project Completion, Albert Cook Outler

Bridwell Library, Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University (SMU) announces the completion of a four-year project to process the papers of Albert Cook Outler (1908-1989). Dr. Outler was a leading United Methodist historical theologian and ecumenicist who taught at Duke University, Yale University, and SMU. The 300 box (147 linear feet) collection documenting Outler's family life, education, ministry, scholarly work, and professional activities was processed by Colleen Bradley-Sanders beginning in December 2010. A finding aid for the collection is available in print and <u>online</u>. An exhibition of ninety items from the Albert Cook Outler papers will be open to the public February 2 to May 1, 2015, in the Bridwell Library Elizabeth Perkins Prothro Galleries. From the Executive Director ALA Midwinter 2015: A Brief Report

A snowstorm failed to dampen the spirits of those of us attending the 2015 ALA Midwinter Conference in Chicago at the end of January. From the exhibit floor to the sessions, technology was one major area of focus.

On the exhibit floor, there seemed to be a larger than usual contingent of scanning and digital

imaging companies, with products targeted to either high end conversion of materials or rapid on the fly scanning for use by patrons. Video products were more prominent, with offerings by Alexander Street Press, Kanopy, Music Box Films, and the WPA Film Library among others. Sage announced a new video product that will launch in April, initially with materials in three different subject categories.

The Top Tech Trends panel organized by LITA included pundits Marshall Breeding and Todd Carpenter. Breeding noted that while the application of technology in libraries is growing, it is still distributed unevenly among libraries and creating groups of haves and have-nots. Carpenter voiced concerns that the library systems managing information are not really geared up to handle open access if it really takes off. The open access movement means that libraries need to think about managing metadata on an article level instead of the journal level - a huge shift from current practice.

ATLA is a voting member of NISO, and I attended their annual business meeting and update session. NISO is continuing their important work on improving standards related to statistical reports such as COUNTER

and SUSHI. One particularly encouraging NISO project is an initiative that was funded by a grant from Sloan to look at altmetrics and how new forms of scholarly output can be used to assess impact.

ATLA is also an ALA Affiliate Member, and the Midwinter Conference provides the opportunity to gather with other Affiliates and learn about their initiatives and upcoming conferences. This year was especially interesting in that a number of them talked about specifically targeting diversity as a priority for the coming year.

Many of the ATLA staff were able to take advantage of the close proximity of the conference and visited the exhibits and attended sessions. We are always on the lookout for potential exhibitors and speakers for our own conference. Expect to see some of the larger trends from ALA Midwinter reflected in the 2015 ATLA Annual Conference in Denver in June. Registration opens in March!
