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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Most of the commentary I've read on the recent U.S. national elections agrees that the results indicate a sense of unease and a quest for change in this country. At the same time, there is concern that the size and complexity of the problems will prevent even a president with a mandate for change from making much headway toward that goal. Not only is it difficult to influence entrenched bureaucracies and special interests, but the law of unintended consequences is always at work to twist well-intended actions in unforeseen ways. Meanwhile our Canadian colleagues face uncertainty about the future in the wake of the failed vote on national unity.

What does this mean for theological libraries and librarians? Short of some major economic disaster, any actions by our national leaders will take time to affect the conditions which press on our parent institutions and, by extension, on all of us. Nor are all those conditions economic in nature, as church bodies struggle with what it means to be faithful in a diverse and highly secular age. The future may not be more murky than it has been, but it certainly isn't any less so.

A friend of mine, who has a history of active participation in church and community affairs, says that there is always a reason to keep working toward your goals. Few people are given the opportunity, like Bill Clinton, to attempt major shifts in the direction of a society. But each of us, by acting according to our best judgment, applying influence in our own spheres, can add to the "tilt" in one direction or another.

That's another way of stating the importance of ATLA for all of us. We have various roles and amounts of influence within our local seminaries and other theological institutions, and we need to make our individual voices heard in support of theological libraries whenever and however we can. But in ATLA we can multiply the effect of those individual voices.

Se we keep plugging away. The legal process of reincorporation is now complete. Through the efforts of John Bollier and others, we have a good shot at raising the last funds needed to match the NEH grant for preservation. Elsewhere in this issue Al Hurd will report on revisions to the Preservation Program as worked out by the Advisory Committee on Preservation. These revisions represent a way to keep this critical program active, but with reduced risk to the Association as a whole. Financial issues continue to press on us, but our very able staff, under the direction of the Board of Directors, are moving ahead with plans to address projected deficits caused by reduced income.

Several weeks ago I had the sad duty, along with Al Hurd, to represent ATLA at the memorial service for Calvin Schmitt, whose obituary appears in this issue. When one witnesses the passing of a giant it is hard not to feel that prospects for the future are diminished. Certainly the Association owes much to the commitment and foundational work of people like Cal. But Cal himself would be the first to affirm that current ATLA members have what it takes to continue that work. Part of his legacy is ATLA itself and its programs: proof that together we can make a difference.

METHODIST MATERIALS AT PITTS TO BE MICROFILMED

The collection of Methodist materials in the Pitts Theology Library at Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, is one of fifteen collections selected for microfilming as part of a \$2,400,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities awarded to SOLINET. Planned in conjunction with the Association of Southeastern Research Libraries, the project will microfilm 28,057 volumes (22,289 titles) over the next three years through a centralized service at SOLINET. The contribution to the project from the Pitts Theology Library will consist of 2,250 embrittled volumes (1,235 titles) of monographs, pamphlets, and serials that deal with the Methodist Church. As titles are selected and shipped for filming, a copy of the shipping list will be sent to ATLA in order to avoid duplication of effort by ATLA's Monograph Preservation Program. Some of the other participating libraries include the College of Charleston (antebellum South Carolina pamphlets), Duke University (southern U.S. pamphlets), and the University of Florida (African languages and linguistics).

UNITED SEMINARY COMPLETES EXPANSION PROGRAM

United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities, New Brighton, Minnesota, has completed a \$2,500,000 construction and renovation project. In the process, the Library space has been doubled, fulfilling the original design of the main building. Study spaces have been added and an archival and storage room developed. Attention was given to energy efficiency with replacement of all windows. Access for handicapped patrons, in fulfillment of the American Disabilities Act, was also provided. Arthur L. Merrill is Director of Library Services.

CALVIN H. SCHMITT 1913 - 1992

Calvin Henry Schmitt died in Minneapolis, Minnesota, on October 6 following a massive stroke. He had served McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago and the American Theological Library Association with distinction for more than four decades. Born in Ellsworth, Minnesota in 1913, he spent his boyhood in rural parishes which his father served as a Presbyterian minister in Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Illinois. He received his B.A. degree in psychology from the University of Dubuque in 1934 and did graduate work in psychology at the University of New Mexico in 1934-1935. From 1935 until 1938 he served as an enlisted man in the United States Cavalry in Texas.

Mr. Schmitt entered McCormick Theological Seminary in Chicago. He received his B.D. degree in 1941 and was in the same year ordained as a minister in the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. Following a three-year pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church in Las Vegas, New Mexico, he was Director of the Collegio Americano in Caracas, Venezuela, from 1944 until 1948, and then returned to this country for a year of graduate study in New York City: Old Testament at Union Theological Seminary and library science at Columbia University.

In 1949 he was appointed Librarian of McCormick Theological Seminary, a post which he held until his retirement in 1980. He also served as Instructor in Hebrew from 1949 until 1961 and was named Professor of Bibliography in 1957. Following the move of McCormick Seminary to Chicago's south side in 1975, Mr. Schmitt was General Director of the Jesuit-Krauss-McCormick Library until 1980.

He attended his first ATLA conference and joined the Association in 1949. He served for three years as Treasurer from 1951 until 1954, was Vice-president in 1956-57, and the seventh president of the Association in 1957-58. He was Chairman of the Periodical Indexing Board from 1959 until 1979 and was Secretary of the Library Development Program from 1961 until 1966. Calvin Schmitt is the only member of the ATLA whom the Association has honored with a Festschrift: Essays on Theological Librarianship Presented to Calvin Henry Schmitt, edited by Peter De Klerk and Earle Hilgert and published by the ATLA in 1980.

During his entire professional library career he continued to provide significant service to the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the Fund for Theological Education, and the Chicago Area Theological Library Association.

He married Alice Muir in 1941. They had two children, David and Janet. All three survive him.

Funeral services were held in Minnesota on October 8, and a memorial service was held in the McGaw Center at McCormick Seminary in Chicago on October 24.

In conclusion, the Editor of the <u>Newsletter</u> asks the privilege of saying his own farewell to Cal Schmitt because Providence happily determined that our careers in our profession and in this Association would be coincident and that our personal relationship would be close. As I have thought about preparing this paragraph, the two words which have come most readily to my mind have been "integrity" and "strength." When Cal become your friend or

your colleague in an endeavor, you could count on him absolutely — and to the end. When differences of approach or opinion arose, you could count on his total support if you were right, and you could count on his friendship and respect if he thought you were wrong. When he faced problems in his own library or the problems of this Association, he had the capacity to see them clearly, to articulate them in concise and unequivocal language, and to propose solutions which were at once practical, achieveable, and humane. And he had the will and the perserverance to press on until they were accomplished. I have had no professional colleague over these past four decades for whom I have had greater respect.

BOSTON UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY LIBRARY RECEIVES GOODWILL INDUSTRIES ARCHIVES

The Archives of Morgan Memorial Goodwill Industries, Incorporated, including publications and records from The Church of All Nations in Boston's South End, have been given to the Library of the Boston University School of Theology. Cataloged by Goodwill's archivist and 1940 graduate of Boston University School of Theology, the Reverend Henry E. Helms, the material covers the period from Goodwill's beginnings in 1895 through 1990.

Morgan Memorial Goodwill Industries was established in Boston by Edgar J. Helms after his graduation from the Boston University School of Theology in 1893. As a demonstration of the social gospel in practice, Helms's mission of providing "not charity, but a chance" laid the foundation stone for a self-help concept that spread over North America and overseas in the following decades. Today, Goodwill Industries is North America's leading non-profit provider of vocational services for people with disabilities and other special needs. The Archives are available by appointment to scholars working in this field. Myra Siegenthaler is Librarian of the Boston University School of Theology.

NAME AUTHORITY WORKSHOP HELD IN EVANSTON

On October 23 and 24 the ATLA Technical Services Section and the Education Committee sponsored a Name Authority Workshop at Garrett-Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston, Illinois. Ten Chicago area catalogers attended the workshop, which was led by Judy Knop and her colleagues Susan Sponberg and Barry Hopkins from the ATLA Preservation Board. Each of the participants received authorization to create personal name authority records in an OCLC/LSP save file for review by ATLA Preservation Board staff members. After an initial review period, it is hoped that participating catalogers will be able to submit authority records directly to the Library of Congress for addition to the national database. The project will continue to meet in order to deal with problems and expand the coverage to include corporate body and uniform title headings.

The ATLA name authority project will be reviewed in 1993 as to whether it can be expanded to include catalogers in other locations. Supervising the project places an additional burden on the Preservation Board staff, and any expansion is dependent on identifying catalogers in other locations who can share the burden of supervision. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

DREW UNIVERSITY LIBRARY ACQUIRES MAJOR METHODIST RESEARCH COLLECTION

Drew University Library in Madison, New Jersey, has purchased one of the largest collections of Methodist materials in private hands. Assembled over fifty years by Methodist pastor/teacher Oliver Beckerlegge, York, England, the Beckerlegge collection contains nearly 10,000 items, from rare manuscripts and books, to periodicals and pamphlets, to hymnals and circuit plans dating from the middle 18th to the early 20th centuries.

Trained at Richmond Theological College, London, and the Universities of Sheffield and Göttingen, Beckerlegge has spent most of his career as a parish pastor. An expert hymnologist, he was a member of the editorial team that prepared the current hymnal of the Methodist Church in Great Britain, Hymns and Psalms (1983). He also co-edited John Wesley's A Collection of Hymns for the Use of the People Called Methodists (1983) for the Oxford Edition of the Works of John Wesley, and has prepared scholarly editions of the unpublished sermons and poetry of Charles Wesley.

The purchase ranks in importance with the acquisition of the Osborn Collection of 1880, the Tipple Collection of 1938 and the Maser Collection of 1976 and significantly strengthens Drew's status as an international center for Methodist study.

HELEN KNUBEL DIES AT 91

Helen M. Knubel, archivist of the Lutheran Church, died on July 23 at Lawrence Hospital in Bronxville, New York. She was 91 years old. She lived in New Rochelle, New York, until she recently entered the Wartburg Nursing Home in Mount Vernon, New York. Miss Knubel died of respiratory failure.

Miss Knubel was considered the foremost archivist of the history of the Lutheran Church in North America. She helped to gather and maintain records of the earliest settlements of Lutherans in the United States and Canada and organized the library and archives of the National Lutheran Council, which coordinated the service work of more than thirty Lutheran groups.

From 1954 to 1966 she was Secretary of Research and Statistics of the National Lutheran Council. From 1967 to her retirement in 1971, she was Associate Director of the Office of Research, Statistics and Archives to the Council's successor, the Lutheran Council in the U.S.A. She also founded and directed the Oral History of Cooperative Lutheranism in America.

Miss Knubel was born in New York City. Her father, Frederick H. Knubel, was president of the United Church in America from its founding in 1918 to 1944. She studied at the New School for Social Research; the Biblical Seminary of New York, the predecessor to the New York Theological Seminary, and the Columbia University School of Library Service. She was an Associate Member of the ATLA during her professional career.

ATLA MONOGRAPH PRESERVATION PROGRAM

Part I. Introduction

Since February ATLA staff - with the help of an Advisory Committee composed of John Bollier, Myron Chace, Milton McC. Gatch, Richard Spoor, Paul Stuehrenberg, Charles Willard, and Donald Vorp - has been revising the ATLA Monograph Preservation Program. Revisions were reported to ATLA members at the annual June conference and appeared in the recently issued 1992 Summary of Proceedings ... (p. 32-40).

There are two reasons for revising the Monograph Preservation Program.

— First, during the past two years the Program's revenues, which depended on annual subscription sales of microfiche collections, have declined more than 35 per cent; full subscriptions have declined to 10 from a high of 17. The decline in revenues, despite concurrent strong funding support from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Pew Charitable Trusts, indicated that the Program was headed for financial trouble and recurring deficits. Management and the ATLA Board of Directors had strong and compelling reasons to keep the Program going but realized that its structure and funding must change dramatically to remove the financial risk to ATLA and its member libraries.

-- Second, since 1985 the Program has operated on a "great books" approach, selecting an annual bibliography of more then 5,500 titles in a particular subject. The bibliography was then circulated to donor libraries, which furnished the titles for filming. Approximately 3,500 titles on 4,000+microfiche were filmed annually. And although PREFIR member libraries could select up to 50 titles annually for preservation filming, the Program's method of filming from a bibliography precluded it from responding to a library's local, and perhaps larger, preservation needs.

Revisions made to the Program address the financial risk that ATLA and its member libraries have borne, and they provide a structure for meeting the preservation needs of the local library. Instead of initiating the subject content for filming, ATLA will coordinate proposals from individual libraries, develop proposals, and administer the project.

Although the revised Monograph Preservation Program's first three-year work cycle will begin in January 1994, implementation of the new program will begin in December 1992 when ATLA member libraries will be invited to submit "mini-proposals" on the monographs or collections their libraries want to film.

Part II. Revised ATLA Monograph Preservation Program.

- A. Program Components
- 1. Participation in the Program is available to all ATLA PREFIR member libraries;
- 1.2. To participate, libraries are required to identify candidate titles for preservation filming by survey or other methods, local criteria, such as brittle paper, paucity of materials, significance of collections, subcollections, or subject areas. Alternatively, a library may select a number of unrelated titles that meet the project's date scope (1850-1916) for preservation filming;
- 1.3. Participants will assume expense for removing the books to be filmed from their shelves, deaccession them, and ship them to the vendors for further preparation for filming;

- 2. ATLA will solicit and develop proposals, determine a work and production schedule (in consultation with participant libraries), and administer the grant;
- 3. Access to books preserved will be according to AACR2 and the MARC record format. However, minimal level cataloging will be done for titles in the revised program;
- 3.1. Bibliographic records will be distributed to the bibliographic utilities and will be made available for custom tapeload at a library's own expense;
- 3.2. Participant libraries may catalog the titles submitted for filming. Libraries that do not want to catalog titles will so indicate this in their initial proposal. Filming vendors will catalog these titles.
- 3.3. The vendor will do all materials preparation and final film inspection;
- 3.3.1. The Program will seek funding support for cataloging, materials preparation, and film inspection.
- 4. Titles will be filmed on 35mm silver halide roll film, thereby meeting prevailing preservation standards and providing several options for reformatting;
- 4.1. Filming includes a master, print master (both to be retained by ATLA), and a positive copy to be provided to the donor/participating library;
- 4.2. Distribution copies will be provided on-demand to other libraries for imprints from 1850-1915+;
- 5. RLG guidelines will be observed in the preparation and filming of materials.
 - B. Scope of Materials to be Filmed
 - 1. Program Track 1: Includes imprints from 1850 to 1915+.
- 2. Program Track 2: Participating libraries would in consultation with ATLA management develop their own internal criteria such as age and condition, use, ability to rebind to identify candidate titles for preservation filming. However, the titles in Track 2 would not be restricted to the 1850-1915+ imprint dates. As titles are no longer duplicated and distributed, the titles thus selected and included are permitted under the one copy replacement guideline of the present copyright law. Additional copies could be made at a later date when the copyright expired or permission to duplicate was obtained from the copyright holder.

C. Program Procedures

- 1. ATLA will publish a funding and project schedule and solicit from ATLA PREFIR member libraries monograph preservation project proposals that are within the program's scope (see section B. Scope of Materials to be Filmed).
- 2. ATLA PREFIR member libraries will prepare mini-proposals that describe the collections they have identified for preservation filming. These mini-proposals will follow the NEH proposals for the preservation of library materials, including:
 - 2.1. Significance of the Materials;
 - 2.2. Condition of the Materials;
 - 2.3. Current access to the collection:
 - 2.4. Selection for Preservation

ATLA MONOGRAPH PRESERVATION PROGRAM - Continued

- 3. ATLA will coordinate the individual proposals into a larger single proposal(s) to be submitted to appropriate funding agencies, including:
 - 3.1. the project's plan of work;
 - 3.2. staffing;
 - 3.3. bibliographic control;
 - 3.4. storage of preserved materials.
- 3.5. The Program will operate on a three-year funding and work cycle. Therefore, libraries will be required to commit up to three years of providing materials, and local financial support for gathering materials and shipping them, as well as providing support for cataloging.

Part III. Calendar for Solicitation and Proposal(s) Submissions

- 1. Early December (beginning 1992): Announce and invite proposals from ATLA libraries for collections to be filmed. Announcement will contain guidelines: description and scope, number of titles, etc.
- 2. January 15: Notice of intent to submit a monograph preservation proposal to be received by ATLA. Initial submission will indicate number of titles within the Program scope statements, subject areas, and any other special information about the titles to be filmed that may present problems.
- 3. March 15: Library submits to ATLA a "mini-proposal" that addresses the proposal outline format and questions that appear in the NEH Preservation Guidelines.
- 3.1. Between March 15 and April 15, ATLA obtains bids from filming vendors.
- 4. April 15: ATLA coordinates and completes details on the mini-proposals submitted, compiling them into a single proposal that is forwarded to NEH for a preliminary review and critique.

ATLA DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES

Twenty-six members and friends gave \$3,205 in 1992 to ATLA's first Annual Giving Fund. Donors designated \$2,555 for unrestricted use, \$500 for preservation, \$100 for endowment and \$50 for member services. The Board of Directors at its midwinter meeting on February 5-6 will determine the use of the \$2,555 in undesignated gifts. The Board is eager to receive suggestions from members in order to make the best decisions concerning the use of these funds. Some suggestions already made are: scholarships to pay registration fees for ATLA members attending the annual conference for the first time; grants to help underwrite regional continuing education events; seed money for a national educational event similar to the "Princeton Institutes" held some years ago. Board President Mary Bischoff urges members to write their suggestions for the use of these funds and send them as soon as possible to any Board members, the Director of Development, or the Executive Director.

The 1992-93 Annual Giving Fund solicitation will be held next March. Some gifts have already been received and applied to this second Annual Giving Fund effort.

ATLA also needs larger planned gifts for developing an Endowment Fund. Thus far, ATLA has been informed of three such gifts through intended bequests. Prospective donors are invited to consider ATLA in their wills for gifts of stocks, bonds, real estate, life insurance or other assets. Inquiries for further information may be directed to the Director of Development.

ATLA continues aggressively to seek grant funding for special projects. Earlier this year it submitted a grant proposal to the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) for funding a three-year (1993-1995) project to preserve on microfilm 300 periodicals, 1875-1950. Staff and an adviaory committee of scholars and librarians, supported by ATLA funds and a 1991 Lilly Endowment planning grant, outlined this program and selected the periodicals. NEH will notify ATLA of its action on this proposal by December 1.

By invitation from a private foundation, ATLA recently submitted a grant proposal to assure full support for the Monograph Preservation Program through 1993. If awarded, this grant will provide \$60,000 for ATLA to qualify for the full \$285,000 in Federal matching funds in the current (1991-1993) \$600,000 NEH grant. The Pew Charitable Trusts, in an earlier grant and a new grant awarded in July 1992, are providing \$225,000 toward this Federal matching portion requirement. ATLA expects to receive notification concerning this latest grant proposal by mid-December.

ATLA has now begun spending funds from the \$30,000 grant awarded in February 1992 by the Trinity Parish Grants Program in New York to automate the production of Bibliografia Theologica Comentada (BTC). BTC is produced by the Institutio Superior Evangelico de Estudios Teologios (ISEDET) in Buenos Aires. In consultation with ATLA staff, ISEDET has now ordered locally the requisite computer equipment. When this equipment is delivered, ATLA technical staff will go to Buenos Aires to install ATLA systems software and train staff in its use.

In August the Director of Development made a presentation on ATLA's International Christian Literature Documentation Project (ICLDP) to the Documentation, Archives and Bibliography working group of the International

Association for Mission Studies (IAMS) at its conference at Hawaii Loa College near Honolulu. ATLA anticipates providing the ICLDP software to selected workstations abroad in the near future to expand the ICLDP network.

AWARDS OFFERED FOR BIBLIOGRAPHICAL PROJECTS

The American Theological Library Association designates a total of one thousand dollars annually for grants-in-aid to bibliographers in the fields of religious studies/theology and theological librarianship. The scope and subject matter are broadly conceived, with the intent of encouraging and stimulating bibliographical work at all levels, especially by persons undertaking their first major bibliographical study. Projects from article to multi-volume length, reflecting research in the full range of religious/theological disciplines are appropriate for consideration. The ATLA Publication Section solicits applications in the fall of each year and meets in January or February to confer the awards, usually two, based on merit and need. The ATLA reserves first publication rights in its Bibliography Series for all projects receiving grants.

A completed application should contain the following: name, address, telephone number, date of application, current position, professional experience, educational background; description of proposal in not more than two typewritten pages, including: title of the project, purpose, scope, and size, format/organization, methodology, anticipated date of completion, proposed expense budget (listing other anticipated sources of financial assistance); two letters of reference, one from a person with a knowledge of the applicant's general bibliograhpical competence, and another from a person acquainted with the applicant's specific project. The deadline for the receipt of applications is January 10, 1993. INTERNET -- A SIGN OF THINGS TO COME

Last June at the Annual Conference, a number of ATLA members expressed interest in computer networking. Thanks to SMU's state-of-the-art facilities, I was able to demonstrate that, courtesy of the Internet, I could connect from SMU"s campus network to the Yale mainframe where I have an account, and from there, subscribe to ATLA's ATLANTIS electronic conference which is hosted by a computer at Harvard. Sounds impressive (and complex), doesn't it?

After that demonstration, I was asked to put together a description of the Internet for distribution to ATLA members. Rather innocently, I agreed. Since then, I have collected a small sample of the massive amount of information that has been written and distributed about this rapidly expanding resource. So far, the paper file is three inches thick and I haven't even printed out the more extensive documents. Here are some of the basics of the Internet, its uses, its resources, and its future. There is plenty more out there to explore and to share.

What is Internet? In non-technical terms, the Internet is a network of networks. Thousands of local networks are connected by high-speed telecommunications links into a huge international network. The Internet is united by a common communication protocol known as TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol). Actually, it gets much more complex, because in addition to actual Internet sites, there are hundreds of sites which have gateways or other indirect connections to the Internet. For example, BITNET is often thought of as a subnet of the Internet, but technically, it isn't. BITNET doesn't even run the same protocol. However, because many BITNET sites are also Internet sites, and because there is a lot of pass-through between the two networks, it often seems that the two networks are more closely related. Frankly, the average Internet user could care less as long as she can connect to the services she wants.

To cite some numbers: There are over 7,500 member networks. -- There are over 1,000,000 computers attached. -- The network is doubling in size every year. The Internet connects all kinds of computers, from Cray Supercomputers to my humble office PC which is a full-fledged Internet node.

How is the Internet related to NREN? For all practical purposes, the Internet is the germ of the proposed National Research and Education Network (NREN). The Internet itself is a co-operative venture of government, education, military, business, and research institutions which saw the potential and had the vision to make it work. Public Law 102-194, The High Performance Computing Act of 1991, sets as one of its major goals a national network to "... provide for the linkage of research institutions and educational institutions, government, and industry in every state," as a shared project by several government agencies. While the act does not specify the mechanisms for access to the NREN, it charges the agencies to "... ensure that the researchers, educators, and students have access to the Network," and stipulates that "... the Network is to provide users with appropriate access to high-performance computing systems, electronic information resources, other research facilities, and libraries."

What can I do on the Internet? Without attempting to list specific services or utilities:

-- Electronic Mail and Conferences: Internet supports electronic mail connections to approximately 4,000,000 Internet users, plus gateways to

commercial services such as GENIE, CompuServ, MCIMail, and soon to Prodigy and America Online. In addition, Internet users may subscribe to BITNET Listserver conferences, including ATLA's ATLANTIS conference. Some Internet hosts support access to USENET network news groups, which is a slightly different model of electronic conference. Finally, some Internet connections support a "chat" connection, where users may exchange comments with others at remote locations in real time.

-- Remote Use of Systems: TCP/IP supports remote terminal sessions with distant hosts through a facility called "TELNET." For example, TELNET allows me to establish a connection with Northwestern University's LUIS OPAC, which includes the United Libraries' holdings. From my desk, I can search their system with the same ease and speed that I search our local OPAC, and I can do the same for Harvard, or Princeton, or ... Well, you get the idea. OCLC and RLIN are also offering their databases for searching over the Internet, and are exploring extending access for input, update, and transfer of records. TELNET isn't perfect. It can only really act as a terminal attaching to a host system. It does not support PC or Macintosh software well because those both make extensive use of display modes and character sets that aren't supported. In time, support for more complex interactions will be developed.

-- File Transfer: TCP/IP supports a high speed file transfer protocol knows as FTP. Various Internet sites provide FTP host systems. These systems contain large archives of computer files, including texts, shareware, and freeware. Many FTP sites allow anonymous login, which means that anyone who can identify the site can connect and transfer files. FTP provides a means to share software and data throughout the Internet. There are several FTP sites that cater to bibliographic information. Commercial software producers such as Novell or Microsoft support FTP sites where they provide demonstration versions of their software, patches, and directions for correcting various problems. In a sense, FTP provides the facility for the Internet to act as an electronic "library."

Where Can I Get More Information? There are a number of published works on the Internet. A couple of non-technical titles are listed below. Many other tools are available free of charge via FTP through an Internet connection.
