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ATLA HOLDS FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL CONFERENCE
IN TORONTO, CANADA

The American Theological Library Association held its forty-fifth annual conference on the campus of the University of Toronto and the campuses of the member institutions of the Toronto School of Theology in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, June 19-22, 1991. The host institution was Trinity College and the host librarian was Linda Corman. Ms. Corman served as Chair of the Host Committee, the other members of which were Grant Bracewell, Emmanuel College, Victoria University; Evelyn Collins, University of St. Michael's College; Adrienne Taylor, Wycliffe College; Chris Tucker, Knox College; and Andrew West, University of St. Michael's College. Approximately 220 members and friends of the Association were in attendance. The program for the conference was prepared by the Program Committee consisting of David D. Bundy, Linda Corman, Roger L. Loyd, Sara J. Myers, and Newland F. Smith, 3rd, Chair. James W. Dunkly, Librarian of the Episcopal Divinity School and Weston School of Theology in Cambridge, Massachusetts, and President of the Association, presided.

Prior to the formal opening of the conference, three Continuing Education Programs were available during the morning and afternoon of Wednesday, June 19: "Special Problems in Serials Cataloging" led by Jean Hirons of the Library of Congress; "Perspectives on Computer-Assisted Research : A Survey with Demonstrations" led by Ian Lancashire and Willard McCarty of the Centre for Computing in the Humanities at the University of Toronto, and John C. Hurd of Trinity College; and "Balancing Copyright Interests : Protection of Author's Rights and Dissemination of Information" led by Ellen M. Kozak and Margaret Ann Wilkinson, attorneys from Milwaukee, Wisconsin and Toronto, respectively. Wednesday was brought to a close by the Opening Reception, held in Sheraton Hall of Wycliffe College and sponsored by UTLAS International Canada.

Thursday morning opened with Matins and the President's Homily in the Trinity College Chapel. Dr. Dunkly's homily was entitled "Theological Libraries and Theological Librarians in Theological Education." This was followed by the first Business Session of the Conference, which featured a presentation of the International Christian Literature Documentation Project by its Director, Douglas W. Geyer. The morning closed with a plenary address entitled "The Future of Academic Libraries/Librarianship" by Carole Moore, Chief Librarian of the University of Toronto. The early afternoon offered a choice of four papers: "Depiction of the Dragon in Christian Art and

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Legend" by Sara W. Berlowitz of San Francisco State University; "Pious Child's Delight : A Survey of Evangelical Writing for Children in the Osborne Collection" by Jill Shefrin of the Osborne Collection of Early English Children's Books; "Building Your Library : A Bookseller's Perspective" by Brian Carter of Oxford, England; and "From Movement to Institution : A Case Study of Charismatic Renewal in the Anglican Church of Canada" by David Reed of Wycliffe College. The afternoon's program was completed with a plenary address entitled "Canadian Religious Historiography : An Overview" by John S. Moir of Knox College. On Thursday evening there were meetings of the eight denominational groups: Anglican/Episcopal, Baptist, Campbell-Stone, Lutheran, Methodist, Presbyterian/Reformed, Roman Catholic, and United Church of Christ.

Friday's program began with the third plenary address of the conference, "The ATLA Preservation Project" by Albert E. Hurd, ATLA Executive Director of Programs. The remainder of the morning was given over to meetings of Interest Groups for Technical Services, Collection Evaluation and Development, and Publication. Both Friday afternoon and evening were left free of scheduled events.

Saturday morning opened with a choice of four workshops: "Grantsmanship for Libraries : Practical Approaches for Fundraising" led by Judith N. Kharbas of the University of Rochester, and Christopher Brennan of the Ambrose Swasey Library in Rochester, New York; "American Culture, Theological Education and the Development of Modern Communications" led by Elmer J. O'Brien of the United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohio; "Cataloging Rare Books in Theological Libraries" led by Sandra Alston and Anne Jocz, both of the Thomas Fisher Rare Book Library, and Maureen Harris of the University of Toronto Library; and "Managing Financial Information in Libraries : II" led by Mary R. Bischoff of the Jesuit-Krauss-McCormick Library in Chicago, Illinois, and Roger L. Loyd of the Brudwell Library at Southern Methodist University. These workshops were followed by the second Business Session of the forty-fifth conference. Saturday afternoon again offered attendees a choice, this time among four papers: "The Toronto Erasmus Project" by Jane E. Phillips of the University of Kentucky; "A Primer on Bibliographic Database Clean-up" by Robert J. Kepple of Library Technologies, Incorporated; "Finding the Real Susanna : Portraits of Susanna Wesley" by Elizabeth Hart of the Vancouver School of Theology; and "The Flesh and the Spirit : The Liturgical Illustrations of Eric Gill" by Richard Landon of the Thomas Fisher Rare Book Library. The afternoon and the formal conference closed with meetings of Interest Groups for Public Services, Rare Books and Special Collections, and Automation and Technology; and Users' Groups for Theological Users, RLIN, and Bib-Base. Saturday evening brought the traditional closing reception in Alumni Hall and banquet in Burwash Hall, both on the campus of Victoria University. The Arbor Oak Trio performed at both events.

The annual Summary of Proceedings of the ATLA, to be issued later in the year, will include the reports, papers, and addresses delivered at the conference.

The Association elected to three-year terms on the Board of Directors: David D. Bundy, Librarian of the Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis, Indiana; Linda Corman, Librarian of Trinity College in Toronto,

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Ontario; and David J. Wartluft, Librarian of The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The Board of Directors at its final meeting of the conference on Sunday, June 23, reelected for the 1991-92 year the three officers who had served the Association during the 1990-91 year: President, James W. Dunkly, Librarian of the Episcopal Divinity School and Weston School of Theology in Cambridge, Massachusetts; Vice-president, Mary R. Bischoff, Librarian of the Jesuit-Krauss-McCormick Library in Chicago, Illinois; and Secretary-Treasurer, Robert A. Olsen, Jr., Librarian of the Brite Divinity School at Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas. A complete roster of the officials of the ATLA, the membership of the Board of Directors, the membership of the various committees, and the holders of special appointments in the Association will be found elsewhere in this issue of the Newsletter.

In meetings on Monday, June 17, Wednesday, June 19, and Sunday, June 23, the Board of Directors took the following actions:

- accepted the invitation from Vanderbilt Divinity School in Nashville, Tennessee, to hold the 1995 annual conference on its campus;
- directed the Executive Secretary to develop, in consultation with the Member Services Committee, an instrument for collecting statistics;
- approved the policy that the Nominating Committee shall consult with the Board of Directors and the committees of the Board regarding the personnel needs of these bodies;
- approved, with some amendments, a draft of the Handbook for Conferences of the American Theological Library Association submitted by the Annual Conference Committee;
- approved a recommendation from the Financial Management Committee that the Association establish an endowment fund to receive gifts and bequests of all kinds, whether restricted or unrestricted, holding the principal intact and invested to produce income;
- voted that the Board of Directors appoint an Executive Director who shall be responsible for the administration of all duly authorized programs, services, and other activities of the Association, this appointment to become effect as of July 1, 1991, and to have a term of five years, renewable;
- voted that the Executive Director report to and be reviewed regularly by the Board of Directors;
- voted to recommend to the Association that it amend the Bylaws so as to designate the Executive Director as the chief executive officer of the Corporation (Association);
- voted to appoint Albert E. Hurd to the post of Executive Director;
- elected as officers of the Association for 1991-92: James W. Dunkly, President; Mary R. Bischoff, Vice-president; and Robert A. Olsen, Jr., Secretary-Treasurer;
- approved the organization of two new interest groups within the Association: the Bib-Base Users Group, and the College and University Librarians Section;
- agreed that the Executive Director will be responsible for making appointments of ATLA representatives to other organizations, in consultation with the appropriate bodies within the Association; and

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- set the next meeting of the Board of Directors for January 31-February 2, 1992.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

Fond memories of Toronto still linger for many of us as we bring the summer to a close - or as we have it brought to a close, through no doing of our own, however much we might have it continue. I hope that our annual conference proved as energizing and satisfying for you as it did for me. Renewed thanks from the entire Association to all who made that week so marvelous.

The reorganization we accomplished at Toronto is already serving us well. Transition to a full-time Executive Director has gone smoothly, and Al Hurd will be reporting on his work in subsequent issues of the Newsletter. Our Association is extraordinarily fortunate to have him available to us for this position now, and even more fortunate to have had him already in place as Executive Director of Programs. Working with Al and with Susan Sponberg, our Executive Secretary, continues to be a great pleasure for me.

Of course you will send along your own dues promptly, but is there someone else in your library or in your area who would profit from being a member of ATLA, and whom it would profit us to have as a member? Perhaps a religion bibliographer in a local university library would be interested, or a staff member in your own place who has not yet joined. If your institution is a member but you are not, please become a personal member as well so that you can join more effectively in the common work of our Association.

Finally, it is an extraordinary privilege to be asked to serve as your president, and all the more an extraordinary privilege to be asked to do so for a second year. I value that trust more than I can say, and I hope that this second year of service to you will be more helpful to the Association than the first. (After all, now I have no more excuses, for I should know what a president's year is like!) With the help of the rest of you, the year will go well, and I look forward to it immensely. 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REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

Another annual conference is behind us, but the benefits of workshops and papers on issues that affect our libraries and the way we do our work; of business sessions during which we made decisions affecting our Association; of time spent with friends around the mealtable; of opportunities to relax in the fascinating city of Toronto remain.

The 1991 annual conference marked the first time we have met on a Wednesday-Saturday schedule. We are interested in hearing your opinion of this meeting plan, and we urge you to send your comments to the Executive Secretary or to Sara Myers, Chair of the Annual Conference Committee.

We celebrate the ATLA Board's official recognition of two additional interest groups: the College and University Librarians Section, Marti Alt, Chair; and the Bib-Base Users Group, Bill Miller, Chair. If you are interested in belonging to these or other ALTA interest groups - Automation and Technology, Collection Evaluation and Development, Publication, Public Services, Rare Books and Special Collections, or Technical Services - please contact the Executive Secretary. Interest group steering committee chairs also are welcome to communicate the needs of their groups to this office.

Our Board of Directors participated in a special pre-conference workshop with dynamic governance consultant John Carver, who presented ATLA with suggestions and challenges to put our governance structure to its most effective use. The Board took a landmark step in that direction by appointing Al Hurd as the Association's first Executive Director.

Following a stimulating week in Toronto, it was necessary to resume our usual office routine. Dues invoices were mailed to individuals and institutions on August 1. Institutions also received a questionnaire concerning a machine-readable format for the reporting of our annual statistics; institutional representatives are encouraged to return the survey at their earliest convenience.

In addition to invoices, we also mailed 140 sets of Library Materials Exchange labels. All institutional members of ATLA are eligible to participate in the program and will remain on the active list provided they send out at least one exchange list in the eighteen months prior to the annual label mailing. If you would like for your institution to participate in the Library Materials Exchange, or if you have any questions about the program, please feel free to contact the Executive Secretary.

Preparation of the annual Summary of Proceedings is underway. We also are preparing for such Fall projects as the annual gathering of statistics. Ways to streamline procedures for providing member services, such as use of office technology and cooperation with Programs staff, are being explored. In addition, the Executive Director, the Executive Secretary, and key Programs staff met recently with the Board's Strategic Planning Committee to continue identifying long-range goals for our Association's future.

It was wonderful to meet and greet many of you in Toronto, but there are many with whom I have not had the opportunity to communicate directly. If you have questions or comments about the Association and the services we provide, please do not hesitate to contact me.

TECHNICAL SERVICES AT ATLA IN TORONTO

In an almost-annual procedure, the Section voted to change its name from the Technical Services Division to the Technical Services Section. Members also elected new Interim Steering Committee members Ferne Weimer (Graham Center Library, 2-year term), Eileen Saner (Associated Mennonite Seminaries, 3-year term), and Jeffrey Brigham (Andover Newton, 4-year term). A "Proposed Plan of Organization" was distributed and discussed; it will be voted on in Dallas. Copies are available from John Thompson at the address below.

A proposal for an ATLA authority record database called TARP (Theological Authority Record Project) was presented for discussion. Consisting of non-LC authority records created by ATLA libraries, this database will be distributed on 5.25" floppy diskettes in WordPerfect 5.0 format. Information on how to submit records and how to obtain a copy of the database will be published in the ATLA Newsletter. (See the update on TARP elsewhere in this Newsletter.)

Plans for programs at ATLA 1992 in Dallas were also presented. The Section will sponsor a "preconference" on the afternoon of June 17, 1992, consisting of round table discussions on topics such as the assignment of subject headings, serials cataloging, preservation needs, audio-visual cataloging, creation of headings for corporate bodies, liturgical works, sacred works, etc. Other ideas for papers or workshops during the Dallas conference include cataloging of microforms; automated system selection; looking at the library catalog from the perspective of reference librarians and catalogers; space needs; and the interface between technical services and circulation in an automated system.

To enhance communication, the Interim Steering Committee is encouraging the development of a more descriptive membership list, including job description and other information such as the types of automated systems implemented at a particular institution; and the development of a "mentoring" program. To facilitate the former, the sign-up sheet from the Section meeting will be published in a forthcoming issue of Current LC Subject Headings in the Field of Religion.

After transacting the Section business, the meeting broke into discussion groups on serials, authority records, and automated systems.

VANDERBILT DIVINITY LIBRARY
ACQUIRES GLATZER LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES

The Vanderbilt Divinity Library in Nashville, Tennessee, has acquired the Judaica library and archives of Rabbi Nahum Norbert Glatzer. The purchase was made possible by the support of Raymond and Arlene Zimmerman. The Divinity Library's Judaica Collection was recently renamed the "Mary and Harry Zimmerman Judaica Collection" in honor of Raymond Zimmerman's parents. Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Zimmerman's financial commitment to the expansion of the Zimmerman Judaica Collection is directly responsible for the Divinity Library's successful bid to acquire Dr. Glatzer's distinguished collection. The Heard Library Society provided additional support for the purchase by assisting with the appraisal, shipping and preliminary processing of the Glatzer collection.

The three parts of the Glatzer Library acquired will be an important addition to the library's existing Judaica Collection. More than 4,100 items compose the German Judaica collection which includes writing by the great 19th and 20th century German Jewish thinkers: Leopold Zunz, Hermann Cohen, Franz Rosenzweig, Martin Buber, and Gershom Scholem, as well as works of historians Heinrich Graetz, Simon Dubnow, and S.W. Baron. Approximately 1,600 Hebrew and Yiddish books include classic Hebrew texts from ancient to modern times. The third component of the Glatzer Library is approximately 100 English, German and Hebrew periodicals from the 19th and 20th centuries.

The archive consists of Franz Rosenzweig manuscripts, correspondence and ephemera; Martin Buber manuscripts and correspondence; and correspondence between Glatzer and the Zunz and Ehrenberg families. Also purchased with the collection are the Schocken Book Archives, materials dealing with Schocken Books' publications during Dr. Glatzer's tenure as its director.

Nahum Norbert Glatzer was born in 1903 in Lemberg (then on the eastern frontier of the Hapsburg empire; today "Lvov" in the western Ukraine) and raised in Frankfurt. His career as a teacher of Jewish history and thought began as early as 1923 when he became a lecturer at the "Freies Judisches Lehrhaus" established in Frankfurt in 1920 by Franz Rosenzweig. In 1932, after obtaining his doctorate in the fields of Middle Eastern studies, philosophy, and the history of religion, Dr. Glatzer was appointed to succeed Martin Buber as lecturer in Judaic studies at the University of Frankfurt. His tenure in that position, however, proved to be brief. After Hitler's accession to power on January 30, 1933, Glatzer seized the opportunity then available to emigrate - first to Palestine and a few years later to America. In 1950 he joined the faculty of the newly bounded Brandeis University near Boston. In 1957 he became chairman of the Department of Judaic and Near Eastern Studies at Brandeis. After stepping down from that position in 1973, he held a professorship in Jewish studies at Boston University.

Glatzer authored numerous books, of which the earliest appeared in Germany before his emigration. His enduring relationship with the great publishing house of Salman Schocken dates from that period. In the early years of the Third Reich when ghettoized Jewish cultural life was still permitted to flourish, Schocken published Glatzer's study of the Tannaim and his History of Talmudic Times as well as his translations into German of S.J. Agnon's modern Hebrew prose. Among the rich fruits of Glatzer's scholarly

work in America are Franz Rosenzweig: His Life and Thought (1953), Leopold Zunz: Jew, German, European (1964), and a book devoted to Kafka (1974). Dr. Glatzer's library reflects his wide-ranging interests and embodies the intellectual achievement of one of the preeminent 20th century scholars in the field of Judaic studies.

The Judaica Collection of the Divinity Library was begun in 1945 with the acquisition of the professional library of Ismar Elbogen, noted authority on Jewish history and religion. Frederick Kuhlman, Director of the Joint University Library at that time, felt that Vanderbilt was a logical location for a center for Jewish studies because there was an absence of any center of Jewish learning in the Southeast and the library could serve a need to ground a better understanding and appreciation of Judaism. Indeed, today this collection serves the research needs of non-denominational, ecumenical scholars at Vanderbilt and elsewhere. The collection focuses on the historical and social aspects of Judaism and early antiquity. From the initial acquisitions of 1,837 titles, the collection numbered more than 7,000 titles by 1980. The incorporation of the Glatzer Library and Archives is an outstanding addition to the Mary and Harry Zimmerman Judaica collection.

SILBERMAN JUDAICA COLLECTION
GIVEN TO VANDERBILT DIVINITY LIBRARY

The Vanderbilt Divinity Library in Nashville, Tennessee, has received as a gift a substantial portion of the professional library of Professor Lou H. Silberman, Hillel Professor of Jewish Literature and Thought, Emeritus. Professor Silberman was instrumental in the development of the Judaica Collection of the Divinity Library during his tenure at Vanderbilt. The receipt of this first portion of his library will further enhance the Mary and Harry Zimmerman Judaica Collection, which already bears the imprint of his advice and expertise.

Professor Silberman came to Vanderbilt in 1952, to replace Samuel Sandmel as Hillel Professor. Since his retirement in 1980, he has resided in Tucson, Arizona, where he has served as a Visiting Professor in the Department of Oriental Studies since 1981. Professor Silberman also served as a consultant to the Divinity Library in the recent acquisition of the Nahum N. Glatzer Judaica Collection.

Over 500 volumes have been received from Professor Silberman in this initial gift, with the balance of his library to be donated at some future date. Also included in this gift were some additional archival files, which will augment the file of Professor Silberman's papers already held in the Special Collections Unit of the Jean and Alexander Heard Library. William Hook is Director of the Divinity Library.

MINUTES OF THE PUBLIC SERVICES STEERING COMMITTEE
AND SECTION MEETINGS, JUNE 1991

At the 1991 ATLA Conference in Toronto, the Public Services Steering Committee met twice and the Section as a whole met once.

The first meeting of the Steering Committee took place on Thursday, June 20. Present were Norman Anderson, Chair; Judy Clarence; Shieu-Yu Hwang; Kirk Moll; and Robert Phillips.

The Committee was asked to respond to a letter from Sharon Taylor, the Chair of the Member Services Committee, and to new developments in the organization of the ATLA. Among the comments: (1) Perhaps oversight of the interest groups by the Executive Director of the ATLA would be a good idea. (2) The old way - utilizing Board liaisons - was better. The Board and the Annual Conference Committee seem remote and are becoming more so. More contact, not less, is needed. (3) The increased autonomy of the interest groups reduces the sense of responsibility to the organization as a whole. (4) It would be nice if the interest groups could simply be settled for a while and allowed a chance to flourish rather than be forced to continually reestablish themselves and their place in the organization. The overall tone of the comments was mild and constructive.

Regarding the idea of a Council of interest group chairs, which Sharon Taylor had put forward, the Committee thought it a good idea. Minimally it would allow the interest groups to be aware of each other's plans and thus allow a great degree of coordination.

The Committee decided that it wished to continue the Public Services Section, and it developed an organizational plan to be approved at the next meeting of the Section.

Mr. Anderson briefly reflected on his years as Chair - how he had seen the Reader Services Section grow into a flourishing program-and-project-oriented Public Services Section. He then suggested that it was time he step down as Chair. Judy Clarence was asked by the Committee to serve as Chair for the upcoming year. Mr. Anderson volunteered to replace her as editor of the Public Services column in the Newsletter. Kirk Moll volunteered to discuss use of a Mac hypercard for bibliographic instruction in biblical exegesis at the June 1992 Public Services Section meeting in Dallas. Shieu-Yu Hwang announced that she was resigning from the Committee.

The Committee decided to seek publication of last year's minutes, taken by Evelyn Collins, in this year's Proceedings, with appropriate notes to avoid confusion. They had become lost in the mail or the shuffle.

The Committee then proceeded to plan the agenda for the Section meeting to take place on Saturday, June 22. In response to a request by Norman Kansfield, it decided to use a small part of the meeting for announcements of public services job openings. But, picking up on an idea proposed at the 1990 Conference, the bulk of the meeting was to be devoted to a panel discussion on student workers and paraprofessionals in public services.

The Steering Committee's final agenda item was ideas for the 1992 Conference in Dallas. These ideas included continuing discussion of the use of CD-ROMs in reference services, of the Religion Index, of confidentiality issues, and of bibliographic instruction; initiating discussion of inter-library loan issues; pursuing strategies for greater sharing of bibliographies and guides; and suggesting out-of-print reference titles for

microfiche publication by the ATLA. An idea proposed by John Thompson for the 1992 Conference was favorably received, namely, having a panel discussion about the library catalog from the perspective of both reference and technical services. It was suggested that such a panel include not only some who have worked on both sides of the catalog but also some who have sharply defined opposite perspectives.

The Public Services Section met for one hour on Saturday, June 22, beginning at 3:30 p.m. Norman Anderson chaired the session. Approximately 35 persons attended. Several job openings were announced.

A motion was made by Robert Phillips and seconded by Judy Clarence regarding the organization of the Section:

1. That the Public Services Section continue as an interest group in the ATLA.

2. That the "Nature and Aims" statement published in the Newsletter, vol. 36, no. 3 (February 18, 1989) continue to serve as the foundational document of the Section.

3. That the Steering Committee continue, that it do so with a fairly informal structure, and that it have 5 to 7 members, all volunteers appointed by the Chair.

4. That the election of the upcoming year's Chair be by the Steering Committee of the current year.

5. That replacement of longer term Steering Committee members or of those who choose to resign from the Steering Committee take place as new volunteers come on, i.e., not necessarily according to a set cycle.

6. That the Public Services Section be project and program oriented.

After a short discussion, the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Anderson then announced that Judy Clarence would serve as the Chair for the upcoming year. She and the other members of the Steering Committee, including two new volunteers - Evelyn Collins and Patrick Graham - were introduced. Shieu-Yu Hwang was thanked for her service on the Steering Committee, as she had decided not to serve any longer. Seth Kasten was also thanked for his service with the Committee, particularly as Board Liaison.

Mr. Anderson invited any with contributions for the Public Services column in the Newsletter to submit them to him. And he invited those interested in serving on the Steering Committee or who had ideas for the Section to contact Judy Clarence.

Kirk Moll reported that titles previously suggested by the Section for reprinting are now in the pipeline for filming by the ATLA. It was the feeling of the Section that there should be a hardcopy option.

Mr. Anderson then introduced the panel that was to discuss "Student Workers and Paraprofessionals in Public Services" or "Student Works A to Z" (perhaps an exaggeration). The members of the panel included Kirk Moll (St. Olafs), Bonnie VanDerlinder (Colgate-Rochester), and Kris Rankka (Graduate Theological Union). Mr. Anderson briefly introduced the range of problems and challenges one encounters with student workers, such as hiring, paperwork, administrative interference, foreign students, scheduling, training, evaluation, incentives, and policies with regard to the answering of reference questions. Kirk Moll spoke on the interaction of student workers with

library automation, which revealed that automation does not automatically eliminate many common problems and that in fact it may introduce new wrinkles. Bonnie VanDerlinder spoke on evaluation and dismissal warnings, using some of her own in-house forms as examples. Kris Rankka spoke on paraprofessionals and students at the reference desk. Several useful comments and questions followed.

The second meeting of the Steering Committee immediately followed the Section meeting.

Mr. Anderson asked Judy Clarence to chair the meeting. Two additional members were appointed to the Steering Committee: Alva Caldwell and Genevieve R. Luna. Thus the Committee for 1991/92 is composed of Judy Clarence as Chair, Alva Caldwell, Evelyn Collins, Patrick Graham, Genevieve R. Luna, Kirk Moll, and Robert Phillips, with Norman Anderson serving as column editor. All were present.

Judy Clarence expressed thanks to Mr. Anderson for his years of leadership of the Committee.

Patrick Graham volunteered to take over the Clearinghouse project that was previously in the hands of Sara J. Myers and to gather bibliographies, guides, and other library documents for the Clearinghouse.

Robert Phillips and Patrick Graham volunteered to submit introductory bibliographies to Mr. Anderson for publication in the next two issues of the Newsletter.

The Committee decided to suggest interlibrary loan policy and practice as a subject worthy of special attention at an upcoming conference, perhaps in the form of a free pre-conference workshop. A brief discussion of the issues revealed just how ripe a topic it is. Another idea that surfaced for future consideration was how to better serve Doctor of Ministry students through public services.

The Committee decided to request that next year's Section meeting be one and a half to two hours long. The feeling was that this year's panel discussion could easily have gone on for an additional hour to everyone's benefit and that the program-oriented nature of the Public Services Section would simply require additional time. Further, the Committee expressed a hope that there could be advance billing of its topics of focus at next year's Conference.

The listserver is a feature of modern telecommunication that may aid libraries by promoting discussion about developments and issues in their field. If you have access to BITNET or the Internet, you may subscribe to a listserver simply by sending a message (e.g., subscribe bi-1 Jane E. Doe) to the listserver (e.g., listserv@bingvmb). Alternatively, the entire process may be done on a single line: tell listserv@bingvmb subscribe bi-1 Jane E. Doe. There is no charge to subscribe, and you may leave the list at any time. When your subscription has been accepted, you will be told how to communicate with the listserver and begin receiving messages sent by others to the list. Subscribers raise questions, ask for advice related to local problems, or pose major issues for discussion. The original message, as well as all replies, are distributed to each subscriber. REPORT FROM ATLA LIAISON TO CC:DA

The ALA Committee on Cataloging: Description and Access (CC:DA) met in Atlanta, Georgia, June 29-July 1, 1991, with Joyce L. Farris attending as Liaison from ATLA.

Machine-readable AACR2. On Saturday, June 29, CC:DA held an open hearing on the machine-readable AACR2. After introductory remarks by Ben Tucker, Chair of the Joint Steering Committee for the Revision of AACR (JSC), Randall Barry of the Library of Congress (LC) described his work in developing a format for use with AACR2 in machine-readable form. Sarah Thomas described the National Agricultural Library's project for developing a computer-based cataloger's workstation. The audience expressed a strong desire to have a machine-readable version of AACR2 available as soon as possible.

Task Force on Conference Proceedings. CC:DA will form a joint task force with ACRL to plan a 1994 conference program on bibliographic access to conference proceedings.

Task Force on Indentations. The task force was discharged, corrections to indentations being included in a document on typos submitted to JSC.

Task Force on Interactive Media. Following a meeting on July 2 of the ALA Committee on Cataloging New Media and the ALA Joint Advisory Committee on Nonbook Materials, CC:DA was asked by these bodies to appoint a task force to develop guidelines for the cataloging of interactive media.

Task Force on Multiple Versions. The first meeting of CC:DA was taken up almost entirely with discussion of an interim report from the Task Force, including draft guidelines for cataloging reproductions. In this draft, a reproduction is defined as "an item that is a copy of another item and is intended to function as a substitute for that item." It is proposed that the unique features of the reproduction be recorded separately from the description of the original; that a GMD, if used, would appear in the description of the original as well as the reproduction; and that any cataloging element for the reproduction that is identical to the original need not be repeated in the description of the reproduction.

Inclusins in the scope of reproduction cataloging are: photocopies; microform copies; reproductions of partial runs of periodicals and multipart items which do not qualify as distinct editions; tape dubs of sound recordings; moving image materials; copies of photographic prints and negatives. Excluded from the use of this technique are: distinct editions; reprints containing significant alterations or additions; simultaneous publications; reissues of sound recordings; sound or video recordings issued simultaneously in more than one format; realia or three-dimensional artifacts; and two-dimensional reproductions of three-dimensional materials. At this point, neither list is considered exhaustive.

The definition of "edition" needs to be examined, in view of the technology for handling materials which might result in multiple versions.

The guidelines would be used as a supplement to AACR2 rules and to rules for the separate media. The cataloging rules will be examined with a view toward providing helpful examples. The guidelines should be applicable to reproductions in all formats, but the Task Force is finding it difficult to develop general guidelines because of the wide variety of materials that need to be handled and the wide variety of audience. Some implementation

concerns were also expressed in the draft. The mixing of bibliographic and holdings information presents a problem for some Task Force members who feel that reproduction information should be stored and processed as bibliographic information separate from any related holdings records. The Task Force has been working with a model using a full bibliographic description for the original, with dependent bibliographic descriptions for each reproduction. This would allow multiple users merely to attach their holdings to the appropriate version, thus saving some cataloging effort.

MARBI distributed to CC:DA members their Proposal No. 91-13, May 24, 1991, outlining two alternatives for accommodating version information in the USMARC holdings format: 1) using field 533, Reproduction Note, with a newly defined subfield 7 to record fixed-length data elements of the reproduction; and 2) "breaking out" field 843 into separate fields with the same tags as the bibliographic format, with coded data elements recording in new subfields of field 841 (Holdings Coded Data Values). The proposals were to be discussed at the MARBI meeting during the June conference. Results of that discussion have not yet been distributed to CC:DA members.

The Task Force will continue to work on the guidelines, following suggestions made at the CC:DA meetings, and will work in close cooperation with MARBI on the matter of holdings and to be sure that needed access points are provided.

Proposed rule revisions submitted to JSC:

2.7B18. Contents: To reword the last sentence to read: "When recording titles formally, take them from the source in the item being cataloged that provides the best identification."

2.13A. Chief source of information (Early works): To delete "half-title" from the list of title page substitutes, to retain the Glossary definition of half-title, and to accept an LC rule interpretation directing the cataloger to choose the cover as a title page substitute in certain cases.

9.3B2. Number of records, statements, etc. (File characteristics area): Instead of making rule changes specifically allowing the use of terms such as kilobyte, megabyte and gigabyte in the File characteristics area, as suggested by the Australian Committee on Cataloguing, CC:DA would prefer to transcribe the information as it appears on the piece, adding examples to the text using these terms in lower case and including an example showing the term in abbreviated form.

21.7A1. Collections and works produced under editorial direction: To delete the final paragraph ("Do not apply this rule to works emanating from ...") and to provide cross references to rules 21.23C and 21.23D.

Chapter 22. Headings for persons: CC:DA accepted LC's review of AACR2 for instances in which the word "Scandinavian" may have been used incorrectly and agreed to the proposed new rule dealing with Icelandic names: "22.XX. Entry of Icelandic names. 22.XXA. Enter an Icelandic name under the first given name, followed by the other given names (if present), by the patronymic, and by the family name, in direct order. If a phrase naming a place follows the given name(s), patronymic or family name, treat it as an integral part of the name. Refer from the patronymic and from the family name."

25.20A1. Catholic liturgical works. Early works: To correct the first example to read:

Appendix A.10A. Note area: To restore the 1978 wording by deleting the third sentence ("Capitalize the first word following the introductory wording and a colon (see 1.7A1)") and the second example.

Appendix C.3B1. Arabic numerals vs. numbers expressed in words: In c), to delete the phrase "unless a particular rule directs otherwise (see 1.4F1)."

Proposed rule revisions which have not yet been approved by CC:DA:

22.8. Entry under given name, etc.: Ben Tucker, of the Library of Congress, has proposed adding as the new second sentence of 22.8A1: "In case of doubt, as when reference sources are not conclusive, prefer to enter under the last element, and in that case, follow the instructions in 22.5B (cf. 22.8B)."

1.1G. Items without a collective title: CC:DA agreed with the general approach of the Canadian Committee on Cataloguing (CCC) in its position on rule 1.1G and its subrules, suggesting "If an item lacks a collective title, describe the item according to the instructions at .1G in chapters 2-11." CC:DA will ask CCC to examine the rest of the rules, keeping in mind that the concept is valid for all types of media.

THEOLOGICAL AUTHORITY RECORD PROJECT (TARP) UPDATE

ATLA catalogers have been talking for years about creating their own database of authority records that are not in the LC Name Authority file. Will anything come of it? Well, we are now several steps closer to reality. The most significant step forward is the establishment of contact with the PACSCL (Philadelphia Area Consortium of Special Collections Libraries), which has produced the "Philadelphia Name Authority File," which consists of over 5500 records in WordPerfect format. PACSCL is now negotiating with the Library of Congress about loading some portion of their records into the LC Name Authority File, and their advice about what to do and what to avoid will certainly make TARP a much more viable project. To incorporate some of their recommendations, however, will take some additional time. Please watch for news and instructions! The major topic for discussion concerned plans for the 1992 annual conference in Dallas. Another major concern of the meeting was determining just how the steering committee would function, how members would be chosen for it, and how maximum input from the total CEADS membership can be encouraged. The committee will send a form and questionnaire to CEADS members soliciting their opinions the last week of December before coming up with a final plan.

ANZTLA 1991 CONFERENCE DRAWS RECORD ATTENDANCE

The 1991 conference of the Australian and New Zealand Theological Library Association, held at Morling College, Eastwood, New South Wales, July 5-8, attracted a record attendance of 51 participants, with strong contingents from New Zealand (seven) and Western Australia (four), and one each from Papua New Guinea and Fiji. The conference followed the very successful weekend format (Friday to Monday) of the previous year.

The main emphasis of professional development activities was on reader education. Joyce Kirk (School of Information Studies, University of Technology-Kuring-gai) led the way with her paper, "Information Literacy: What Does It Mean for Reader Education Programs?," explaining the concept of information literacy and stressing the need to develop information skills for self-directed learning. Robin Walsh (Reader Services Librarian, Macquarie University) followed up with "The Changing Face of Reader Education," emphasising the change taking place from large group instruction to small group and individual instruction, illustrating his talk with user-friendly examples of programs and materials developed at Macquarie University.

The conference also featured two joint sessions with the Australian and New Zealand Association of Theological Schools. The first focused on automation, with input provided by Hans Arns (Catholic Institute of Sydney, Manly, New South Wales) on "Automated Subject Retrieval in Theological Libraries" and Trevor Zweck (Luther Campus, North Adelaide, South Australia) on "Some Transpacific Observations of Automation in Theological Libraries." Both pressed the need for cooperation in collection development planning, promoting the concepts of conspectus and the distributed national collection. The second joint session, led by Lawrence McIntosh (Joint Theological Library, Parkville, Victoria), involved a discussion of the faculty-librarian partnership, exploring such topics as the role of the library committee, roles of librarians and lecturers in book selection, and qualifications of librarians.

Concurrent workshops were also held on the Dewey Decimal Classification (with Kim Robinson, Moore Theological College, Newtown, New South Wales, as convenor) and the Pettee Classification (with Philip Harvey, Joint Theological Library, Parkville, Victoria, as convenor). Other sessions included a report by Trevor Zweck on his job exchange with Dick Mintel of Trinity Lutheran Seminary, Columbus, Ohio, in 1990, and some assistance to voluntary indexers for the Australian Religion Index.

Participants were given a choice of visits to various Sydney libraries: the new Centre for Ministry Library, North Parramatta (with its newly-installed SEA-Urica automated system); the great Moore Theological College Library, Newtown (with its newly-installed Dynix automated system); and Macquarie University Library, North Ryde (featuring CD-ROM technology, reader services, and the online catalogue). In a more relaxed vein, the librarians enjoyed a bus trip, via Kuring-gai Wildflower Gardens, to the northern beaches, taking in a visit to historic St. Patrick's College, Manly, on the return trip. At the traditional conference dinner, the Reverend David Brown contributed food for thought in an entertaining address.

The main initiative coming from the General Meeting is a project to produce a style manual for writers of term papers, theses, etc. with primary input coming from Lawrence McIntosh. In business carried forward from the

previous meeting, the constitution was altered to permit a second person to be included in institutional membership on the payment of an additional fee (currently \$5). In other decisions, the meeting resolved: to press the New Zealand Library Association for endorsement of ANZTLA Standards; to establish a committee to look into all matters relating to future updating of AULOTS; to give financial support to two missionary librarians in attendance at the conference; to retain membership fees at \$20 and newsletter subscriptions at \$15; and to hold the next conference in Adelaide, June 26-29, 1992. Wendy Davis (St. Barnabas College, Belair, South Australia) was elected as extra member of the Executive Committee (making it an all-South Australian committee for the next year) and Helen Greenwood (St. John's/Trinity, Auckland, New Zealand) was elected Statistician; all other office-bearers being re-elected.

UNIVERSITY OF KING'S COLLEGE DEDICATES NEW LIBRARY

The University of King's College in Halifax, Nova Scotia, held the opening ceremonies for its new Library on May 14. The 22,000 square-foot building, in the Georgian style, will easily accommodate the present collection of 85,000 volumes, including over 25,000 old and rare books. King's College was founded in 1789 by the Loyalist Anglican Bishop Charles Inglis, and while no longer a divinity school, retains its affiliations with the Anglican Church. The special collections include books and manuscripts concerning the early history of the Loyalists and the Church in Canada, and historical theological libraries established in the colonial period. King's has the largest collection of Anglican divinity and church history in Atlantic Canada. The modern collections are strong in Patristics, Scholastic theology, the English Reformation, the Oxford Movement, and the history of doctrine.

A lecture on "Libraries and Posterity" was delivered after the opening by the Reverend Doctor Leonard Boyle, O.P., Prefect of the Biblioteca Apostolica Vaticana (i.e., Head of the Vatican Library) in Rome, and an internationally recognized authority on palaeography and mediaeval manuscripts. Drawing from his own experiences of using codices in his teaching of palaeography, and taking his examples from the collection of mediaeval manuscripts at King's, he urged us to remember that "what must be aimed at is to preserve for posterity what we have inherited from the past, that it is not denied to the present generation of posterity."

APOLLINARIAN CHRISTOLOGY
A Pathfinder Bibliography

SCOPE: This bibliographic guide suggests an approach to the use of the library for those wishing to research the christology of Apollinarius of Laodicea (c. 310-c. 390). This guide also includes some related information regarding the orthodox reaction of the Cappadocians to Apollinarian christology. Note: A common alternate spelling for Apollinarius is Apollinaris.

[Reference BR 95.08 1974] "Apollinarius" and "Apollinarianism" (72-73) provides a brief summary of the life of Apollinarius, his writings, and his theology. A short bibliography is also included.

The New Schaff-Herzog Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge. Editor in chief Samuel Macauley Jackson. Vol. 1. New York: Funk and Wagnall's Company, 1908. [Reference BR 95.S43] "Apollinaris of Laodicea" by Albert Henry Newman (229-31) provides a brief summary of the life of Apollinarius, his writings, and his christology.

SELECT ANNOTATED BIBLIOGRAPHY: The following brief selection of materials gives those titles which have been frequently mentioned in various bibliographies. All have excellent introductory material and most have specific material ideal for detailed research.

Bethune-Baker, J.F. An Introduction to the Early History of Christian Doctrine. 5th ed. London: Methuen & Co., 1933. [BT 25.B4 1933] Chapter 14 (239-54) provides a classical interpretation of Apollinarius and a general introduction into the christology of Apollinarius. Copious footnotes make this work especially helpful in relating this work to the whole of Apollinarian research.

de Riedmatten, Henri. "Some Neglected Aspects of Apollinarian Christology." Dominican Studies 1 (1948): 239-260. This work is rather narrow in scope provides some valuable insights not available in general introductions. Special attention is given to the development of the significance of the Virgin Birth in Apollinarius' christology and his adaptation of traducianism.

- Grillmeier, Aloys. Christ in Christian Tradition: From the Apostolic Age to Chalcedon (451). Translated by John Bowden. 2nd rev. ed. Vol. 1. Atlanta: John Knox Press, 1975. [BT 198.G743 1975] Section 1, chapter 6 (329-343), provides an excellent introduction into the thought of Apollinarius with clear interpretative insights. Special attention is given to the "heavenly man" image in Apollinarius and his "one nature" doctrine.
- Leitzmann, Hans. Apollinaris von Laodicea und seine Schule: Texte und Untersuchungen. Hildesheim: Georg Olms Verlag, 1970. [BT 25.L5 1970] This book provides the standardized Greek texts referred to by almost all sources. All of Apollinarius' known works, letters, and fragments are included here. Invaluable as a primary source for the student with a knowledge of Greek. Also contains good commentary in German.
- Norris, Richard Alfred. The Christological Controversy. Philadelphia: Fortress Press, 1980. [BT 918.C44] A brief, but thorough introduction is provided on pages 21-23. The significance of this work is the English translation of some of Apollinarius' works (103-11), specifically of On the Union in Christ of the Body with the Godhead and thirty-three fragments. This is the best English primary source located.
- Prestige, George L. Fathers and Heretics: Six Studies in Dogmatic Faith. London: S.P.C.K., 1953. [BR 45.B3 1940] Lecture 5 (94-119) is devoted to Apollinarius and provides a classical interpretation to his christological views.
- Raven, Charles Earle. Apollinarianism: An Essay on the Christology of the Early Church. New York: AMS Press, 1978. [BT 1340.R3 1978] The most comprehensive work on Apollinarius in English. This work provides information regarding the life, works, and theological thought of Apollinarius. A standard work in this area of study.
- Wesche, Kenneth Paul. "The Union of God and Man in Jesus Christ in the Thought of Gregory of Nazianzus." St. Vladimir's Theological Quarterly 28 (Spring 1984): 83-96. This article contrasts the christology of Gregory of Nazianzus with Apollinarius. Special interpretative insights related to Apollinarius' application of Nicene trinitarian language to his christology.

MOODY BIBLE INSTITUTE OCCUPIES NEW LIBRARY

The library at Moody Bible Institute in Chicago, Illinois, has moved into its new quarters in the newly completed Learning Resource Center. The new LRC is located on two floors of the Sweeting Center for World Evangelization, a four-story academic building. The upper three floors house faculty offices, classroom space, and a communications production studio. The library occupies the lower level and shares the first floor with the Audio Visual Department. The new LRC includes a new music library, an archival research facility with compact storage, and ample room for future expansion.

TURPIN LIBRARY AT DALLAS SEMINARY COMPLETES AUTOMATION

On July 25, the Turpin Library at the Dallas Theological Seminary, Dallas, Texas, completed its automation project, coordinated by Marvin Hunn, the Assistant Librarian. The book collection has been barcoded, 68,000 volumes have been relabeled with Library of Congress Classification numbers, and Sirsi's Unicorn public access catalog has been brought online. More than 118,000 items, including 23,000 tape-loaded records of PREFIR microfiche, are represented in the catalog.

Retrospective conversion was begun in 1985, along with a switch from the Pettee to Library of Congress Classification. In 1990, Dr. Steven Perry, Technical Services Librarian, and his staff began cataloging on Unicorn along with OCLC's CAT CD-450 and dial access. Phil Johnson, Collection Development Librarian, brought acquisitions and serials control into the integrated system; and John Beverage, Public Services Librarian, managed the transition to the circulation and reserve modules. Robert D. Ibach, Jr., is Director of the Turpin Library.
