REPORT FROM THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

As you know, I set a high priority on the prompt publication of our <u>Proceedings</u>. I am happy to inform you that we are once more on a fast schedule. Indeed, some of you may receive your copies before you receive this <u>Newsletter</u>. Mrs. O'Brien has contributed substantially to this prompt publication by the efforts she makes to solicit copy from the speakers. I am sure you will be pleased to know that we have provided a little different print than in the past. We were able to use a laser printer for the final copy. ATLA does not own a laser printer in this office, but I was able to transfer the files to another computer equipped with a laser printer. While speaking of the <u>Proceedings</u>, may I request that you indicate to me any errors in the membership directory. We have tried to keep that up-to-date and consistent, but given the size of our Association and the many shifts that take place, it is not easy to do.

Elsewhere in this <u>Newsletter</u> there will be reports from both the Preservation and the Index Boards. Both are moving along. Although the prices of the indexes don't come down, the quality of the products and their rich diversity keep developing. We're getting more for our dollars, because of hardware and software improvements at the Index office. The Preservation Board, too, has made some dramatic steps forward. As their report will show, we are still struggling with a thin budget. The truth is, we are passing through a very critical period for the success of the project. The financial straits we find ourselves in, for the most part, were not of our making. I feel satisfied that long strides have been taken to make the project more self-sustaining, but it will continue to need our support.

Both boards have space problems, and it is clear that the issue of a common site for ATLA processes is becoming more and more critical. This question too is being addressed by a special committee of the ATLA Board. Those of us who work more closely with the program boards are sensitive to the growing tension that space is creating for those who work day-by-day in crowded conditions, as well as for those are are planning for future development.

Shortly, we will be mailing out the Statistical Report forms to the ATLA institutional members. We hope that we will continue to get full response.

A responsibility of this office in the past had been a personnel job opportunity function. Admittedly, little has been done. I receive frequent inquiries from students and prospective employees looking for opportunities to work. Although I have made no moves in this direction, I am giving serious thought to the possibility of an ATLA bulletin board whereon we could keep job openings and list biographies of people looking for jobs in theological librarianship.

For reasons I am at a loss to understand, a high percentage of our membership was slow in renewing this year. As of September 24, 125 of our 500 or so members had not renewed. Happily, the picture is much brighter now as I write, but there are still a number who have not renewed who normally would. I am well aware that many factors can contribute to this situation. I report it only because it does negatively affect our revenues, and it makes it difficult to plan responsibly for the number of <u>Proceedings</u> we should send out. The dilemma for me is compounded, because if <u>I follow</u> through and drop

them from the rolls of the <u>Newsletter</u> and <u>Proceedings</u>, they may not even realize that fact. Technically, action by the Board of Directors is required to drop members, but the <u>Newsletter</u> is paid for out of the annual membership fees. Next year I hope to find a more creative way to deal with this concern.

I am happy to say that preparations for our annual conference are moving along well. The housing and opportunities in Lexington seem quite favorable. Plan ahead. Let's make the week of June 20-24, 1988, an ATLA banner week!

SEPTLA SPONSORS PRESERVATION WORKSHOP

The Southeastern Pennsylvania Theological Library Association, in cooperation with the Lehigh Valley Association of Independent Colleges, sponsored a one-day workshop on preservation and conservation on September 22, 1987. The program was led by John Dean, an international leader in the field of preservation and conservation, and Conservation Librarian at Cornell University. A native of Great Britain, Dean has also served as Conservation Librarian at the Newberry Library and Johns Hopkins University. He was assisted by Ann Kenney, a member of the Board of The Society of American Archivists. The workshop was designed to provide a framework for the establishment and maintenance of a basic preservation program and included demonstrations of preservation techniques and a discussion of common problems. Thirty-two librarians and staff members from SEPTLA institutions participated and will follow up the seminar, held at the Moravian Theological Seminary in Bethlehem, with a discussion of library binding and the viewing of "Slow Fires," a recent film on library conservation and preservation, at its December meeting at the Evangelical Theological Seminary in Myerstown, Pennsylvania.

RELIGION INDEXES ANNOUNCEMENTS

We apologize for the lengthy delay in the delivery of Religion Index One: Periodicals (RIO), vol. 18. As we have become more efficient in the moving of our many computer operations in-house, we are more and more aware of our lack of control over the final work we contract out to third parties. The long delay in your receipt of RIO, vol. 18, is attributable to external vendors. First, RIO, vol. 18 experienced a six-week delay in May and June due to the typesetter. Second, we were promised eight weeks turn-around by the printer, which meant that it would be shipped to subscribers on September 4, 1987. This shipping date was not met by the printer because the binder had not completed his work. Because we had experienced some problems with the quality of the bindings on the book reviews, we asked the printer to examine more carefully the binding work done on RIO, vol. 18. The printer did this after receiving the bound copies in late September, only to find that the headbands had been glued incorrectly on a significant number of RIO's. The repair of the headbands took about a month, and RIO, vol. 18, was finally shipped by October 26, 1987. Needless to say, we are using a different typesetter and printer for future volumes.

RIO, vol. 19 semi-annual, will be at the printers by November 16, 1987. The printer is projecting about five weeks to print, bind, and ship, which means, if all goes well, it will be shipped the week of December 21, 1987.

RIT, 1986, will be shipped in late February 1988.

Many ATLA members have contacted the Religion Indexes about the CD-ROM (REX) being produced by the Foundation for Advanced Biblical Studies. FABS' use of the abstracts from <u>Religion Index One</u>: <u>Periodicals</u> to prepare indices has been referred to our law firm in Chicago, Kirkland and Ellis. We will keep you informed about this matter.

The Index Board met in Chicago on October 13-14. It reviewed and approved the recommendations of the Journal Selection Committee for the addition of twenty-two new titles for inclusion in RIO, vol. 19. A list of these titles appears elsewhere in this Newsletter.

You will be receiving in early December information about the prepublication offer and price for the forthcoming two-volume cumulated, augmented (approximately 1250 titles and 16,000 articles), and revised edition of <u>Religion Index Two: Multi-Author Works</u>, 1976-1980. The pre-publication price for this two-volume set will be \$495.00, which includes handling and shipping. This price will be in effect until October 31, 1988. Libraries will be able to spread their payments over two fiscal years, 1987/88 and 1988/89. In addition, the Indexes will issue each purchaser a \$30.00 credit upon the return of their original volumes of RIT 1976 through 1980. This project is funded in part from a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

YALE DIVINITY SCHOOL LIBRARY TO ADD RESEARCH AND RESOURCE CENTER

Yale Divinity School in New Haven, Connecticut, has announced plans to enlarge the Divinity School Library. A generous gift from Mrs. Gordon B. Tweedy and her daughers will provide a new facility known as The Tweedy Research and Resource Center. This Center will constitute the fourth floor of the Library's East Wing and will add nearly 1,600 square feet of public service space to the library. The Center will provide shelving and use space for non-print media and an academic computer center. Earlier this fall the Divinity Library inaugurated its Scholars Information System, a local area network providing several bibliographic data bases, text data bases, and other research applications. Construction of the Tweedy Center is scheduled to begin on March 1, 1988, and the Center should be open for use October 1, 1988. Dr. Stephen L. Peterson is the Librarian.

PC SOFTWARE FOR TYPING NON-ROMAN LANGUAGES AVAILABLE FROM DUKE UNIVERSITY

For those with PC computers who want to type the Biblical languages, Jeff Gillete offers The Duke Language Toolkit, which allows PC-Write users to produce Greek, Coptic, Amharic, Russian and Hebrew characters and define their own character fonts. The Toolkit requires an EGA board and works with the Toshiba P351, IBM Proprinter and Epson FX-80/85 series printers.

PRESERVATION BOARD REPORT

The following report will be of interest to subscribers and nonsubscribers. Significant changes have been made recently, and new bibliographies are available. Further information can be obtained from the Preservation Office.

<u>Phase One</u>. The 35mm roll microfilm masters are completed, and many of the rolls are in the vault at the University of Chicago. Slightly more than 100 titles are not yet completed out of the 4000 titles chosen; most of them are titles with missing or partial pages. There is currently a backlog of about 250 titles awaiting final inspection and shipping.

<u>Phase Two</u>. To date 1200 titles have been cataloged, and about 1000 have been microfilmed. We had planned to have all of the filming carried out at the University of Chicago, but they have had start-up problems with their new equipment. Meanwhile, NCR has two shifts working on catching up with the microfiche production.

Phase Three. Book selection is underway for Phase Three, and we welcome contributions from subscribing libraries. Our goal is to try to maintain a balance of subjects and a range of differing theological orientations.

<u>Bibliographic Networks</u>. Fifteen hundred records for Phase One have been entered into OCLC, UTLAS, and RLIN (promised loading in early November). Ad additional 600 records have been converted to MARC format inhouse. We are working toward having all Phase One records and more than 1000 from Phase Two sent to the utilities by the end of the year.

<u>Cataloging</u>. At the recent Preservation Board meeting, the decision was made to move from full cataloging to what the Library of Congress calls Minimal (Base) Level Cataloging. To library users, the chief differences will be no subject headings and fewer added entries, fewer notes, and shorter class numbers. All of the data will continue to be filmed on frame one and entered in the utility data bases.

<u>Microfiche Lamination</u>. Microfiche lamination will be discontinued for Phase Two. We are unable to find any commercially available equipment which can do the work for us in the quantities needed.

UNITED BIBLE SOCIETIES ESTABLISHES SERVICE FOR BIBLE TRANSLATORS

The United Bible Societies has initiated a bibliographic service for its own translation personnel and for other persons involved in Bible translation or in research related to Bible translation. The Translation Information Clearinghouse, located in the American Bible Society Library, compiles bibliographies on given research topics and provides a medium for exchanging information and ideas on current projects through its quarterly newsletter. In addition, the Clearinghouse plans to develop other bibliographic and indexing projects related to Bible translation. AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND THEOLOGICAL LIBRARY ASSOCIATION HOLDS ITS SECOND CONFERENCE

As a result of decisions taken at the second conference of the Australian and New Zealand Theological Library Association, August 23-25, 1987, ANZTLA will become structurally and financially independent of the Australian and New Zealand Association of Theological Schools. However, the libraries of ANZATS schools will still remain a primary focus of attention of the Association, and conferences will be held, where practicable, in conjunction with the conferences of ANZATS. In 1988, Australia's Bicentennial Year, ANZTLA will meet at Burgmann College, Australian National University, Acton, Australian Capital Territory, September 4-6, overlapping the ANZATS conference, which will continue through September 9. Appropriately, the latter conference will feature the theme of "Australian Religious History."

A major new initiative of ANZTLA was the decision to investigate the feasibility of producing an Australasian Religion Index. During the next twelve months, a pilot project will be carried out in association with the Centre for Library Studies, Wagga Wagge, New South Wales, with Father Gary Gorman and Mr. John Mills providing liaison with the Centre.

In other decisions, a radically revised and greatly expanded "ANZTLA Standards for Theological Libraries" document was referred to regional chapters for further discussion; the National Catholic Research Council was encouraged to produce an update of the <u>Australasian Union List of Serials in</u> <u>Theological Collections</u> (AULOTS); it was decided to facilitate the exchange of duplicate periodicals by including duplicate lists with <u>Newsletter mail-</u> ings; and the venue for the 1989 conference was tentatively fixed at Auckland, New Zealand.

The meeting re-elected as President and Secretary the Reverend Trevor Zweck and Mr. Hans Arns, respectively, and elected the Reverend Peter Mendham (St. Mark's, Canberra, Australian Capital Territory) as extra member of the Executive. The new Editor of the <u>Newsletter</u> is Mrs. Lyn Pryor (Whitley College, Parkville, Victoria) and Assistant Editor Mr. Philip Harvey (Joint Theological Library, Parkville, Victoria).

The keynote speaker for the conference was Mrs. Fran Awcock, Director of Technical Services for the State Library of Victoria. She spoke of the need to preserve existing materials, to cooperate in collection development and in provision of services, and to exploit the new information technology for more effective service. Father Gary Gorman led a workshop on reference methods and materials, stressing the need for reference tools which are of good quality and relevant to the local situation. Mr. Hal Cain led a workshop on the practicalities and problems of cataloguing, automation, and interlibrary loans. In a final plenary session, Mr. Patrick Lambe (who came to the conference as Assistant Librarian for the United Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, London, and left it as Librarian of New College, Oxford) gave information on the different types of libraries involved in the Association of British Theological and Philosophical Libraries, and Mr. Kim Robinson reported on the American Theological Library Association Conference which he had attended in Berkeley, California.
