Part Two: Streeterville and the Magnificent Mile

Chicago, at its heart, is a swashbuckling town full of ambitious people with audacious plans. One of our many, um, colorful forefathers was Captain George Streeter (above). When Streeter's steamboat ran aground on a sand bar north of the Chicago River in the 1880s, he declared the shoal to be the District of Lake Michigan - an uncharted territory outside the jurisdiction of either the city of Chicago or the State of Illinois.

Streeter presided over a lawless shanty town and vice district on the accumulating silt for over 30

From the Executive Director

The Forecast is Cloudy with a Strong Chance of Collaboration



NFAIS, http://www.nfais.org/, a non-profit organization primarily for producers of information resources, recently held its annual conference. Several ATLA staff members attended and were able to interact with representatives from peer organizations that produce online resources for other disciplines. The theme of the event was Taming the Information Tsunami: The New World of Discovery. Speakers focused on various trends including collaboration through social networks, new ways to analyze large data sets, preservation of both print and digital information, and the impact of cloud

computing.

One of the keynote speakers was Michael Nelson (http://explore.georgetown.edu/people/mrn24/), most recently a visiting professor in Internet Studies at Georgetown University and a former Director of Internet Technology and Strategy at IBM where he managed the team that helped define and implement IBM's Next Generation Internet strategy. His talk focused on how cloud computing will be a game changer across all aspects of work and life. In particular, he highlighted the fact that it enables more direct collaboration and sharing of information.

The reality of cloud computing is also reflected in the recently released 2011 Horizon Report (http://net.educause.edu/ir/library/pdf/HR2011.pdf), an annual report produced by the New Media Consortium and Educause. According to the report, one of the major trends that will impact higher education in general is the increasing use of cloud-based technology and the decentralization of IT support.

Cloud computing has the potential to have an even more direct impact on ATLA member libraries. OCLC is making use of cloud computing with their new Web-scale Management Services (http://www.oclc.org/us/en/webscale/default.htm), which offers an alternative to a library hosting its own traditional ILS system. Ex Libris has announced their next generation library system framework, Alma (http://www.exlibrisgroup.com/category/AlmaOverview), which will also be offered as a cloud service. When multiple libraries use the same cloud-based ILS system, it offers exciting opportunities to gain efficiencies through collaboration. In the same way that cooperative cataloging revolutionized technical services operations, these new forms of ILS systems offer the opportunity for all libraries to share a single file of vendor records for their serials and book suppliers or to use a serials check-in framework spun by a single library then used by many.

Events like the NFAIS meeting always generate lots of opportunities for networking and help ATLA staff generate new ideas for products as well as help us incorporate new technologies into our work. The ATLA Conference offers the same kind of opportunity for our members to network with colleagues, meet new ones, and hear about exciting initiatives happening at other institutions. I hope you'll get your creative juices flowing by joining ATLA in Chicago in June at the Annual Conference.

years before a court finally revoked his claim to the land in 1918. This landfill became the neighborhood of Streeterville, about one mile northeast of our conference hotel. Today, Streeterville contains some of the most prestigious real estate in the city. It is home to Navy Pier, a popular tourist destination. This pier features a 150 foot ferris wheel, shopping, dining, theater, and museums all with a great view of the Chicago skyline. Streeterville is also home to Chicago's Museum of Contemporary Art and the city campus of Northwestern University.

On the western edge of Steeterville is Chicago's Maginificent Mile. This stretch of North Michigan Avenue is home to an eclectic mix of great architecture including the Wrigley Building, Tribune Tower, and the John Hancock building. It also features the historic Chicago Water Tower that survived the 1871 fire and is Chicago's most famous shopping and dining destination.

We hope to share Steeterville with you in a few short months. Who knows, perhaps while taking in the now-elegant surroundings of Oprah's neighborhood you will find your ambition charged and will formulate an audacious plan or two of your own.

Charles Bellinger Authors Book on Violence and Christian Faith



Charles K. Bellinger, Associate Professor of Theology and Ethics at Brite Divinity School, has just published *The Joker is Satan, and So are We: And Other Essays on Violence and Christian Faith*. Written between 1990 and 2010, the essays chart the development of the author's analysis of violence as a central aspect of human culture. Collectively, the essays seek to articulate an understanding of the deep springs of violence that is theologically rooted and psychologically perceptive. Bellinger has previously published *The Genealogy of Violence* (Oxford Univ. Press, 2001) and *The Trinitarian Self* (Pickwick, 2008). Please join us in congratulating him on his latest

Jennifer Woodruff-Tait: The Poisoned Chalice



Jennifer Woodruff Tait has recently published *The Poisoned Chalice:* Eucharistic Grape Juice and Common-Sense Realism in Victorian Methodism (University of Alabama, 2011). This work examines the introduction of grape juice into the celebration of Holy Communion in the late 19th century Methodist Episcopal Church and reveals how a 1,800-year-old practice of using fermented communion wine became theologically incomprehensible in a

mere forty years. Through study of denominational publications, influential exegetical works, popular fiction and songs, and didactic moral literature, she argues that 19th century Methodists, steeped in Baconian models of science and operating from epistemological presuppositions dictated by common-sense realism, placed a premium on the ability to perceive reality accurately in order to act morally. They therefore rejected any action or substance that dulled or confused the senses. This outlook informed Methodist opposition to many popular amusements and behaviors, and they decided to place on the communion table a substance scientifically and theologically

Digital Initiative Funded by the ICC



Building Collections on Methodism for Global Users is a collaborative digitization initiative between Africa University and Drew University. The purpose of the project is to share academic and church-related resources from both schools linked by historic institutional ties to world Methodism.

Through funding by a grant from the International Collaboration Committee of ATLA, ninety print volumes have been transformed into electronic texts. These copies include twentieth century annual conference journals related to the African countries of former Rhodesia and Zimbabwe.

The intent of the initiative is to build the electronic collections of both institutions. This partnership provides additional resources for faculty, staff, and students from both universities. The project also assists outside users who mine the collections for purposes of academic research and church work.

The journals have been digitized and are now available at Internet Archive (http://www.archive.org/) as part of The American Methodism Project collection.
