ATLA 2009 Board Elections

Nominations other than those submitted by the Nominating Committee may be made by petition signed by no fewer than ten individual members, and filed with the Secretary, Eileen Crawford, no later than December 1, 2008. Ballots and the candidates' biographical statements will be sent in January to voting members in good standing. The 2009 election will be performed via electronic ballot; ATLA has contracted with Survey and Ballot Systems, Inc. to administer the web election process. Members will be notified via e-mail when the poll opens and will be provided with complete information on the voting process. Members who do not have e-mail addresses on file with ATLA will receive a paper ballot and instructions.

ATLA Board Election Time Line

October 15, 2008 - ATLA reports slate of nominees to membership.

December 1, 2008 - Deadline for write-in candidates.

December 6, 2008 - ATLA delivers final slate and biographies to Survey & Ballot Systems (SBS).

January 15, 2009 - SBS executes the broadcast e-mail and opens Web balloting site.

January 15 to March 1, 2009 - SBS monitors and maintains Web voting activity.

January 15 to March 1, 2008 - SBS receives paper and Web ballots, validates members and processes paper ballots.

March 2, 2008 - SBS tabulates and delivers results to Nominating Committee by 12 noon EST.

October 2008 marked the third year of Theological Libaries Month, and participation in the event continued to grow apace.

As of November 1, 45 institutions officially celebrated TLM 2008, with

A total of 6,650 bookmarks were ordered, and six finalists were chosen in the second annual TLM Cartoon Caption Contest. Voting for the best captions is open until November 24, 2008. Winners of the contest will be announced in the December ATLA Newsletter.

From the Publications Commitee

The Publications Committee is charged with promoting professional and scholarly publication by ATLA members through publication grants, programming at the annual conference, and other professional development opportunities. On behalf of the Committee, I would like to remind you of a few of these opportunities. First, the Committee encourages you to apply for a 2009 publication grant. One of our favorite tasks is the awarding of grants to help potential authors accomplish their publication goals. Each year, we award grants of up to \$4000 for reimbursable expenses. These awards are given to aid in the development of scholarly work that advances some aspect of theological librarianship or provides bibliographic access to a significant body of literature within theological or religious studies. The upcoming deadline for application is January 16, 2009.

We also encourage your participation at upcoming events, such as the non-credit scholarly writing course offered through the University of Illinois. I participated in this course and found it to be a very rewarding experience. Not only did I meet great colleagues, but I also improved my writing skills. The goal of the course is "to introduce the student to the major genres of scholarly writing primarily through actual writing and editing assignments and discussion of essential elements and approaches to scholarly writing." During the six-week course, we read and critiqued a variety of genres, including abstracts, annotations, reviews, editorials, columns and other opinion pieces, case studies, best practices, surveys and focus group research, and scholarly articles. Believe it or not, reading the work of published authors empowered me to write. The feedback I received on my work was invaluable and effectively demonstrated the connection between reading and writing.
