# From the President Legacy Musings

With the New Year fresh and the holidays behind us, sometimes we reflect on people that were not with us during the holidays in 2015 and who will not be with us as we encounter the "firsts" throughout 2016, as the year of the "first without...." These

individual's legacies were valuable to us in the past and will be missed in the future. Webster's Dictionary defines legacy as "something transmitted by or received from an ancestor or predecessor or from the past." As ATLA enters the future, I looked back at two resources which encouraged and reminded me of ATLA's legacy.

In 1996, ATLA published the following book, "The American Theological Library Association: Essays in Celebration of the First Fifty Years" edited by M. Patrick Graham, Valerie R. Hotchkiss, and Kenneth E. Rowe. Just flipping through the pages reminded me of why I became a theological librarian and how important ATLA is to future theological librarians. (You can find a digital copy on the ATLA Press.) In addition, I browsed through "A Broadening Conversation: Classic Readings in Theological Librarianship" edited by Melody Layton McMahon and David R. Stewart which was published in 2006 in celebration of ATLA's 60th anniversary.

As we enter 2016 (another ten years by the way), I challenge each of us to find something from ATLA's past to remember, to build upon, and to take with us into the challenging future.

# From Staff Leadership ALA Midwinter 2016: A Brief Report

The ALA Midwinter Conference was early this year — so soon after the holidays that I barely had time to refocus my attention on association work again before heading off to Boston.

The Top Ten Tech Trends panel organized by LITA included some new faces this year. Participants on the panel included Jason Griffey (Berkman Center for Internet & Society at Harvard University), Jamie Hollier (Anneal Inc. and Commerce Kitchen), Alex Lent (Millis Public Library), Rong Tang (Simmons College), Jim Hahn (University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign), and Ken Varnum (University of Michigan). A wide range of trends were suggested. Just a few intriguing ones were artificial intelligence based personal assistants that help you set up meetings (x.ai), workflow simplification (Kanban), and cryptocurrency-based applications using blockchain.

One of the most striking sessions I attended was one sponsored by ALA's Center for the Future of Libraries. "Libraries Transform: Understanding Change" was based on John Kotter's well-known 8-step process for leading change. The most important step is the first one: Establishing a sense of urgency. Libraries, like many other organizations, can become complacent. Many times in my past life actively working as a librarian I heard, "Why fix it if it isn't broken?" The session was based on a lighter allegory version, *Our Iceberg Is Melting: Changing and Succeeding Under Any Conditions* (John Kotter and Holger Rathgeber, 2006), which illustrates the methodology and techniques that can be used to change an organization.

Mergers and acquisitions were on the minds of many, particularly with the completion of the <u>ProQuest acquisition of Ex Libris</u> in December. RMG consultants hosted their 26th Annual Presidents' Seminar in which they invite global ILS companies and other library industry executives to discuss initiatives and trends that impact libraries. Unfortunately, this year moderator Rob McGee's questions focused on the financial and legal aspects of mergers and acquisitions

and literally nothing substantive was revealed about future directions in the industry.

Although it also focused on the business side of the information industry, a much more useful session was organized by the Publisher/Vendor/Library Relations Interest Group of ALCTS (Association for Library Collections and Technical Services). "Working Together Through Mergers and Acquisitions: Impacts and Best Practices for the Library Market" featured presentations by high level executives at OCLC, ProQuest, and Penguin Random House as well as the Head of Resource Acquisition and Discovery at the University of Alabama.

ICOLC (International Coalition of Library Consortia) held a breakfast and networking event where information about consortia activities throughout North America was shared. One interesting initiative underway is <a href="Library Simplified">Library Simplified</a>, a project jointly funded by IMLS (Institute of Museum and Library Services) and New York Public Library. NYPL has built a new open source app designed to improve the eBook borrowing and reading experience for users of any library that deploys it. They are also investigating and prototyping a new shared platform to support libraries in providing access to e-content. There is talk among several library consortia about starting a Library Simplified based project that will better support seamless user access to collections shared among consortia members.

ACRL (Association of College and Research Libraries) provided an update on the 2014-2015 ACRL Academic Library Trends and Statistics Survey. This is something that ATLA is monitoring as we begin to consider what the next generation statistical survey for ATLA members should look like.

ATLA staff members Gillian Harrison Cain and Andy Carter also attended the conference, taking in an entirely different set of programs and events and spending time in the exhibits identifying products and services that might be of interest to ATLA members. We are always on the lookout for potential exhibitors and speakers for our own conference. Expect to see some of the larger trends from ALA Midwinter that affect academic libraries reflected in the 2016 ATLA Annual Conference in Long Beach, California, in June.

### **ATLA and Open Access**

Note: This is the first of a series of feature articles written by ATLA Board members that talks about how ATLA's new Strategic Plan resonates with them personally in the context of their own institutions.

One of the goals of ATLA's Strategic Plan, approved by the Board of Directors in February 2015, is to facilitate "open access publishing in the study of religion and theology." Open Access (OA) reflects a shift in business practice about who pays which costs for producing scholarly content in a digital environment. In the traditional subscription model, subscribers who pay a fee are able to use content. In OA, the cost for producing and maintaining content is paid for up front by a sponsoring institution. The content is available to readers at no direct cost to them.

This strategic goal directly affects my library for two reasons. First, my library patrons want excellent library collections and broad access to relevant information. These are core values of ATLA's Strategic Plan. Facilitating OA publishing promotes both excellence in scholarly publishing and broader access to scholarly literature in theology and religion.

I'm all for it. I want patrons to have access to high quality information.

Second, although OA may seem like a nerdy issue for accountants, I see OA as a helpful approach to put a brake on the rising costs of journal subscriptions. As you know, large commercial publishers are taking over production of niche journals that your faculty and students care about. The difficulty here is that new management often raises subscription prices, sometimes dramatically. I'm sure each of you has her favorite example. As a librarian, I worry about the stewardship of my acquisitions budget. I know prices affect the access that my patrons have to the literature they want for teaching, learning, and research. I have dropped

subscriptions to some journals because I was unwilling to pay the price, even though the journal was in an area that is important to teaching and learning at my school.

If our association can use OA approaches to combat higher journal prices, I'm all for it.

To make progress on this strategic goal, the board has approved an implantation plan with five objectives related to OA publishing in the study of religion and theology. The ATLA staff is exploring the OA publishing landscape, seeking collaborators for OA publishing, and increasing OA content in ATLA offerings. The staff is also examining the infrastructure needed to support OA publishing.

There is a role for you, as well: to help identify "at-risk" content which members hope will continue to be available to our patrons through OA publishing. As implementation of our Strategic Plan unfolds, you will have opportunities to identify such content.

The goal about facilitating open access is one of four goals in the Strategic Plan. In future newsletter articles, board members will talk about how these 50,000 foot-level goals impact your work and your patrons.

ATLA flourishes because members, leadership, and staff are committed to our common calling of promoting scholarly communication through the work of libraries and related information providers. I am proud to be a partner with you in this good work.

<u>Columbia University Libraries/Information Services</u> invites applications from scholars and researchers to its annual program designed to facilitate access to Columbia's special and distinctive collections, the <u>Libraries Research Awards</u>.

The Libraries will award ten (10) grants of \$2,500 each on a competitive basis to researchers who can demonstrate a compelling need to consult Columbia University Libraries/ Information Services holdings for their work. The award was established in 2011 and supports scholars and researchers who may benefit from access to Columbia's special and unique collections. Participating Columbia libraries and collections include those located on the Morningside Heights campus: the <a href="Avery Architectural & Fine Arts Library">Avery Architectural & Fine Arts Library</a>, the Burke <a href="Library">Library</a> at Union Theological Seminary, Butler Library, the <a href="Lehman Social Sciences Library">Library</a>, the <a href="Rare Book & Manuscript Library">C. V. Starr East Asian Library</a>, and the <a href="Libraries">Libraries</a>' <a href="Global Studies Collections">Global Studies Collections</a>.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens or Lawful Permanent Residents (LPRs). Persons holding J-1 or F-1 exchange, student, or visitor visas are not eligible for this grant. Preference will be given to those applicants residing outside the greater New York metropolitan area who need to travel to New York City to conduct their research.

Applications will be accepted until February 29, 2016. Award notifications will be sent to applicants by April 30, 2016 for research conducted at Columbia during the period July 1, 2016 – June 30, 2017.

ACLS Digital Extension Grants will support teams of scholars as they enhance existing digital projects in ways that engage new audiences across a range of academic communities and institutions.

To this end, projects supported by these grants may:

- Extend existing digital projects and resources with content that adds diversity or interdisciplinary reach;
- Develop new systems of making existing digital resources available to broader audiences and/or scholars from diverse institutions;
- Foster new team-based work or collaborations that allow scholars from institutions with limited cyberinfrastructure to exploit digital resources
